

COSTLY STEEL STRIKE END NEAR

Russ Atomic Setup Inspection W- Vishinsky Declares

LAKE SUCCESS, Nov. 12 (AP) — Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky insisted today the Soviet Union has offered to open its territory for atomic inspections.

Vishinsky jumped into the closing stages of a UN debate on atomic energy with a fiery answer to John D. Hickerson, assistant secretary of state. Hickerson yesterday told the United Nations special political committee that the Soviet Union refused to open its territory.

Yugos Scrap Treaty With Albanians

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Nov. 12 (AP)—Yugoslavia scrapped her treaty of friendship with Albania today and charged that country with acts of hostility she said were provoked by Soviet Russia.

It marked the first time Premier Marshal Tito's independent communist government has taken the initiative in breaking off friendship pacts with cominform countries.

Previously Russia, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Romania, Hungary and Bulgaria all cast aside those ties with Yugoslavia in steps verging on a break in diplomatic relations.

The note — more than 3000 words long — was handed to the Albanian legation here at noon.

It listed in detail this country's accusations of "hostile" acts on the part of Albania, but emphasized at one point that the Tirana government had been "pushed into its policy of open hostility and violation of the treaty by Russia and the other cominform countries."

The formal renunciation followed by eight days a note to Albania demanding that Albania cease hostile acts, live up to the terms of the treaty and reply to that request "within the shortest possible time."

That note fell just short of an ultimatum.

Fate Quirk Means Death For Convict

HILLSBORO, O., Nov. 12 (AP) Cecil Yankey—facing death in the electric chair—probably pondered the quirk of fate today.

Yankey was charged with the slaying of 71-year-old LeRoy Koodland, an old age pensioner, during a robbery March 20, 1947.

He pleaded guilty at his first trial and was sentenced to life imprisonment.

After serving two and a half years in Ohio penitentiary, he challenged the validity of his sentence because it was handed down by a one-judge court, instead of a jury or a three-judge panel.

The courts upheld his counsel, Miss Cecil Shapiro, in her contention the sentence was illegal.

His second trial before a jury of eight men and four women in Highland county ended yesterday.

The verdict: guilty, without recommendation of mercy.

That makes the death penalty mandatory in Ohio.

Monday Report Spurs Chest Drive Workers

Hundreds of volunteer solicitors, representing every section of the county, were busy today contacting business firms and individuals in preparation for the first report meeting at noon Monday at the Winema hotel of the \$65,541 Klamath County Community Chest campaign.

Virtually every advance report on progress of the drive pointed to ultimate success for the appeal this year, according to Chester H. Hamaker, general chairman. "In addition to generous increases on the part of many contributors, there is just a general feeling in the air that makes us believe we are definitely on the right track this year," the general chairman declared this morning.

Better Returns

"I know of some of our larger industries and firms which are going to report considerably more this year than ever before for the 23 agencies which share in the Chest," Hamaker said. "We certainly are expecting a large crowd of our workers at the noon meeting Monday and there is every reason to look for outstanding reports when the figures are all tabulated."

Chairman Hamaker said that "every single worker is expected to attend the report meeting."

Agencies participating in the campaign and the amounts which will be allocated to each if the campaign meets with success include: Boy Scouts, \$12,134.63; Girl Scouts, \$7930.75; Camp Fire Girls, \$6566.40; Salvation Army, \$10,560; Y.M.C.A., \$8736; Klamath Falls Teen-Age club, \$3840; Chiloquin Teen-Age club, \$840; Merrill Teen-Age club, \$1000, and the 15 agencies of the Oregon State Chest, \$8403.20.

Car Hits Truck, Three Killed

GLENROCK, Wyo., Nov. 12 (AP) Three Glenrock residents were killed instantly last night when their speeding car crashed into a parked truck loaded with oil well equipment.

The Wyoming highway patrol identified the three as Howard Freese, 22, his wife, and Burl Vermillion, 38.

The truck driver, Pete Wiens, Calgary, Alta., told patrolmen he had set flares around his truck, halted three miles east of Glenrock on US 20, and left to have two tires repaired. He was en route from Canada to Texas.

Ohio Student Killed By Frat Brother

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 12 (AP)—An Ohio State university student was shot to death by a fraternity brother today after a homecoming party at the Delta Tau Delta fraternity house.

The victim was Jack T. McKeown, 23, of Norwood, a senior and managing editor of The Ohio State Lantern, student daily. Norwood is a suburb of Cincinnati.

James D. Heer, 20, of Euclid, a first year veterinary student, was taken into custody some time later at the Columbus sewage disposal plant, 5 miles from the fraternity house, after telephoning the state patrol. Euclid is near Cleveland.

Trigger Happy

Detective Kenneth Anderson said Heer admitted the shooting. The officer quoted the student.

"Whenever I get drunk, I get trigger-happy."

McKeown was shot once with a .45 caliber automatic pistol as he tried to disarm Heer on the fraternity house lawn at 2:30 a. m., fraternity men said.

Fraternity brothers said Heer "went berserk" after accompanying a young woman home from the party.

Intoxicated?

At police headquarters the tuxedo-clad Heer asserted he was intoxicated when the shooting occurred, Detective Anderson said.

Heer related he was honorably discharged from the marine corps in 1948.

Joyce Crafton, 22, Cleveland, Heer's companion during the evening, was taken into custody as a material witness. She is not a university student.

Army Plans Sub-Artic War School

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Nov. 12 (AP)—The army is going to study sub-arctic war tactics of the Russo-Finnish war at its frigid Big Delta training center this winter—but it won't say where or how it got the information.

Announcement that the troops would give extended study to the 1939-40 clash was made by Maj. Gen. Stanley L. Scott, army commanding general of Alaska, today.

Describing information concerning Russian-Finnish tactics as "valuable," the announcement did not elaborate on what it includes or how it was obtained.

Scott's announcement stated that new knowledge on northern warfare "recently became available" and that the 1939 winter courses had been expanded to include it.

Established last year, the Big Delta school, near the Alaska highway southeast of Fairbanks, already is rated one of the army's key training centers. Last year 164 officers of the army, air force, navy and allied countries attended the school.

Worker Shot By Tulelake Cop; Critical

TULELAKE—A transient worker was shot early Saturday morning on Tulelake's Main street by a night officer and his condition was reported critical at Klamath Valley hospital in Klamath Falls later today.

Wounded was Gene Molar, 36, whom Chief of Police Pedersen reported had been involved in several Armistice Day squabbles and was finally thrown out of the American Legion hall for causing a disturbance at the dance.

Molar has a bullet wound through the abdomen and surgery was performed shortly after he was brought to the hospital by the Tulelake ambulance.

Gang Fight

Chief Pedersen said Night Officer Gerald Hartz, on patrol through the business district, observed a gang fight and stopped to break it up. Making a second round he saw the same crowd and on investigating found a Tulelake police officer, Jerry Ternus, on the ground and being kicked by Molar. Ternus was off duty at the time.

Hartz attempted to aid Ternus and in the scuffle was allegedly attacked from the back by Molar. Another person grabbed his night stick, Hartz told Chief Pedersen, and at that point he pulled his revolver and shot twice, one shot penetrating Molar's abdomen and passing through the body.

Chief Pedersen said felony charges would be filed against Molar for resisting and attacking an officer.

1 Killed in Rash Of Accidents

SPOKANE, Nov. 12 (AP)—There were 90 traffic accidents in Spokane yesterday and the police department said it was a record number for any 24 hour period in the city.

Benjamin J. Murta, a 77-year-old pedestrian who was struck by a car at an intersection, was the only fatality.

U.S. Steel Signs; Few Idle Left

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 12 (AP) — The most costly steel strike in American history virtually ended today after the CIO United Steelworkers signed the mammoth United States Steel corporation to a pension-insurance pact.

Inland Steel corporation agreed to a similar peace agreement on the Bethlehem pattern three and one-half hours after the big steel settlement last night.

That left only 124,600 strikers idle of about 513,000 steelworkers who walked off their jobs last October 1 in support of demands for company-paid pensions.

Back to Work

The end of the strike against Big Steel, largest steel producers in the world, gave 177,000 unionists the "go back to work" high sign. The agreement covers only 130,000 employees in six major operating subsidiaries but the corporation said the union agreed that all workers should return at once. Formal contracts will be signed later with other subsidiaries.

Union President Philip Murray predicted 90 per cent of basic steel plants which produce raw steel "will be signed to the new Bethlehem type contract by Monday morning."

Provisions

The Bethlehem settlement, signed October 31, provides \$100 minimum monthly pension payments to workers aged 65 who have served 25 years. The workers do not have to pay into the fund but they do contribute to federal social security which is added to company pensions to make up the \$100 total. Workers with fewer years of service will receive proportionately smaller pensions.

Over the nation, the strikers lost an estimated \$770,000,000 (M) wages during the six weeks long strike. Added to that strike loss figure is the \$8,000,000 (M) to \$10,000,000 (M) of steel production which would have been produced if the workers had not struck. Nearly a half million workers in allied industries were furloughed as a result of the steel strike.

Slow Returns

Some of the laid-off workers will be slow in returning to work. In the auto manufacturing industry, where 43,000 employees are idle, several weeks will be required to build up steel stockpiles.

Dean Acheson In Germany For Parleys

HEIDELBERG, Germany, Nov. 12 (AP)—U. S. Secretary of State Acheson, fresh from the Big Three foreign ministers conference in Paris, is scheduled here today with top American military and diplomatic officials in Germany.

Heidelberg is the headquarters for the U. S. armed forces in Europe. Army officials said, however, defense problems were not up for discussion.

The secretary, first American official of his rank to visit Germany since James F. Byrnes came here in 1946, was the guest of Gen. Thomas T. Handy, commander in chief of American forces in Germany, at a mountain-top hotel overlooking this old university city.

Rumor Flood

Acheson's arrival for a four-day visit in Germany was accompanied by a flood of rumors about Germany's position in Western defense plans. Outstanding was a rumor from Paris that the Elbe river dividing the Western zone of occupation from the Russian zone would be considered the Western "defense line," rather than the Rhine. American officials declined to confirm these reports.

Skiing Starts At Crater; Roads Good

For the first time this season, you can get out your skis.

Rangers at Crater Lake national park reported the skiing good Armistice Day and it "should be better" this week-end as the snow is becoming packed.

A three-foot fall in two and one-half days has covered the park with snow and today was bright and clear. There was little hint of snow in the air rangers said although the mercury had risen to a chill 35 degrees by 9 a. m.

Roads OK

No chains are required in the park today and won't be necessary Sunday if it does not snow, rangers advised.

There are no food accommodations in the park area this early in the season but a good attendance is expected this week-end.
