

Senator Sore; Swede Snub Reported

VIENNA, Austria, Nov. 12 (AP)—Senator Thomas (D-Ore.) said today one European country had snubbed his armed forces subcommittee of the senate appropriations committee and "any more money granted to that country will be over my protest."

Thomas did not name the country, but congressional members of his party said he was referring to Sweden.

Ignored
"The government officials," Thomas told newsmen, "acted as if they did not know we were within a thousand miles of the place. . . . The country I refer to has helped no one in the last 135 years. Any one with a military uniform on in that country is a spy. . . . They saw some easy money and they grabbed it—now they want more."

Thomas is chairman of the seven-man subcommittee, which is touring Europe to investigate the use of American aid funds. The party arrived in Vienna last night for conferences with American military and diplomatic officials.

Greece Next
They plan to leave here Monday for Greece. In addition to Thomas, the committee is composed of Senators Maybank (D-SC), McClellan (D-Ark), Robertson (D-Va.), Tamm (R-Minn.), Stennis (D-Miss) and Chavez (D-NM).

The committee has visited Belgium, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Germany and Switzerland. It has yet to visit Greece, Spain, Italy and Britain.

Taylor Irate Over Losing Giant Plant

POCAHELLO, Idaho, Nov. 12 (AP)—Democratic Senator Glen H. Taylor of Idaho today flailed the choice of the Southeast for a new billion dollar research plant for superatomic weapons and guided missiles.

"There is only one reason why the Pacific Northwest and quite possibly Idaho should not have been chosen for the site," the senator declared. "The blame can be placed entirely upon reactionary republican politicians who have operated hand in glove with private power interests to poison the minds of our citizens against the Columbia valley administration."

Hong Kong Safe Now, He Thinks

EDMONTON, Alberta, Nov. 12 (AP)—One foreign correspondent is so confident that the Chinese Communists won't soon attempt an assault on Hong Kong that he is taking his bride back to that potential Far Eastern trouble spot.

Seymour Topping of the Associated Press, married yesterday in Camrose, Alberta, said here last night that Hong Kong is the sole trading contract the Communist regime has with the democracies. The Reds, Topping said, are anxious to maintain that link.

If and when the Communists decide to try to take the British crown colony, Topping said, they probably will try to do it from within. He considered a frontal attack on the reinforced British garrison unlikely.

OSC Professor Gets Award

CORVALLIS, Nov. 12 (AP)—The \$1,000 Borden research award, one of the top national awards of the American Chemistry society, has been presented this year to Dr. George A. Richardson, Oregon State college professor.

Dr. Richardson won the award for his research on the chemistry of milk. He has studied such things as the anti-rancidity of milk, and the stability of carotene in milk.

Man Overboard, Ship Reports

ASTORIA, Ore., Nov. 12 (AP)—The Westport coast guard radio station reported a man overboard from the freighter Calmar in a gale early today.

He was identified as Walter E. Roberts, Somerville, Mass.

The coast guard reported that the vessel radioed that its deckload of lumber shifted and Roberts was thrown overboard some 45 miles west of the Columbia river lightship at 2:30 a.m. Gale winds of over 50 miles an hour were blowing.



Morse Raps Negative Criticism

EUGENE, Nov. 12 (AP)—Senator Wayne Morse urged his fellow republicans to start talking in terms of specific proposals when they criticize the "welfare state" instead of just being against all tendencies towards it. The emphasis, he said, should be on constitutional liberties and guarantees of individual dignity.

He warned his own party members, in a Friday noon speech before the chamber of commerce forum, that the ordinary man is getting the idea that the democrats are concerned with public welfare, and the republicans are not.

Hoover Report
Morse declared that adoption of the Hoover commission's report would be quick, "but not painless" in getting on the proper road to government economy. However, even it will not be effective if congressmen persist in being "all for economy in every district but their own." Because of this attitude, he said, the 81st congress has not done a decent job of cutting government expenditures.

GOP MAN HEADS SEC—

Harry A. McDonald, above, took over as the first republican chairman of the securities and exchange commission, leaving many democrats mystified about how he got the job. McDonald, a former Detroit broker, was appointed to the commission by President Truman in March, 1947. The commission is composed of three democrats and two republicans, and elects its own chairman, but usually with presidential approval, political observers say.

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Dorris Lions To Hold Turkey Shoot

The Dorris Lions club will hold a turkey and pheasant shoot at the Butte Valley Riflemen's club and shooting grounds just north of Dorris at the foot of the hill, Sunday.

Shooting time is from 11 a.m. to dark Sunday and also next Sunday, November 20. Each contestant is to provide his own gun and ammunition.

Separate Squads
Squads using iron sights and those using telescope sights will be set up separately. Large rifles, 22 rifles and pistols will all be shot on separate squads. Marksmanship alone will not always be a requisite to winning, as some targets will win on a scrambled target basis.

Plenty of turkeys are available, as are pheasants. Pheasants are being made available through the courtesy of Cal-Ore Tavern pheasant farms.

An effort will be made to segregate expert marksmen from the average shooter.

Blackmer Returning To France

DENVER, Nov. 12 (AP)—Henry Blackmer, 80, who recently paid \$20,000 in fines for income tax evasion, will return to France. The Rocky Mountain News said last night.

The News said Blackmer, who ended a self-imposed exile of a quarter century in France when he returned to the United States September 22, plans to be in Paris by Christmas.

The News said Thursday night that the government had "unfrozen" some \$10,000,000 (M) of Blackmer's fortune which had been tied up pending settlement of his case.
