"The Backwoods Teacher," written by Joseph Nelson, holds your interest from beginning to end. During the depression years Mr. Nelson accepts an Ozark school to teach. There was one room, and he taught the first eight grades. He was a college graduate prepared to teach Junior college, but the year previous had been a hard one; his pay had consisted of warrants that he was not able to cash. So it was with joy that he accepted this school. He was to be paid sixty dollars a month, and the thought of their future wealth of \$480.00 a year quite overwhelmed Mr. Nelson and his young wife Sally. She had taught their landlady's daughter shorthand and typing to pay for their rent the year before. The Ozark year was a rich and rewarding one for them. The people of the community, and their problems, became a part of their lives. For instance, there was "Sister Viny," who was sort of a scandal, who always said, "I don't do as good as I know how, but as good as I can anyway." "Gram Slocum" was supposed to have the powers of a witch, and of course, there was "Uncle Johnnie" who went around in a wagon with his own coffin in it. "Jest in case" later. It was found that the coffin was serving a purpose, and what a purpose! The book is full of daily living, and with the joy and sorrow it takes. Mr. Nelson has been able to give to us his experiences, and his understanding of these people, and their way of life.
