

SPORTS ROUNDUP

NEW YORK, Nov. 9 (AP)—Lou Little, who can explain almost everything, has his own explanation of the high scoring in football this season. . . It's simply that a coach, in picking his two platoons, puts the fastest and best co-ordinated men on the offensive team. . . "If you make one little mistake against players like that, they're gone for a touchdown," Lou explains. . . Little has watched the best offensive efforts of a lot of good teams while they were running over his Columbia team this fall. . . From that viewpoint, his analysis of two of this week's top Eastern games is this: Dartmouth vs. Cornell—with a few breaks for Dartmouth—should be pretty even; Army is stronger and has a better team than Penn, but that doesn't necessarily mean Army will win.

When Washington and Lee was playing George Washington recently the Generals (that's W & L) drove 80 yards downfield, only to lose the ball on a fumble near the goal line. . . Immediately Coach George Barclay was his defensive unit racing onto the field while the offending offensive players trudged off. . . An uninitiated spectator behind the W & L bench then sang out: "That seems a downright unfair of the coach. The team marches all the way up the field with the ball and just because they make one little mistake, he takes them all out of the ball game."

Promoter Thomas Patrick Gorman of the "skating sensations" is feuding with his star, Barbara Ann Scott, and her mother over a personal non-appearance in Edmonton, Eastern Conference Commissioner A. A. Bushnell argues: "The new personal foul signal in football is a very bad device and the rules committee undoubtedly will change it."

Fairweather Steps Out

PORT SMITH, Ark., Nov. 14 (AP)—Tom Fairweather, a dynamic figure in minor league baseball for nearly half a century, yesterday stepped out as president of the Western association.

Fairweather, World War I mayor of Des Moines, Ia., announced his retirement as president of the class C circuit at the winter meeting of the directors and said he would also vacate as president of the Three-I league after the 1950 season.

Howard Goetz, also of Des Moines, secretary of both the Western association and Three-I leagues, was named by the directors to succeed Fairweather as head of the Western association.

Abe Greene On NBA Hot Seat

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Nov. 14 (AP)—The national boxing association opened its annual convention today with an undercurrent movement to unseat Abe J. Greene as the national commissioner.

Some 150 delegates representing 80 member organizations—the largest representation in the NBA's history—will consider ring insurance for worn out fighters and standard manager-fighter contracts at the business session today.

Cannon Clashes

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J. (AP)—The Little Brass Cannon, symbol of Middle Three supremacy on the gridiron since 1940, has been saluting Rutgers' touchdowns since 1945. Given to Rutgers in 1931, the cannon was put up by the university in 1940 to be awarded to the leading team in the Lafayette-Lehigh-Rutgers trio. Lafayette won the cannon the first year, held it until 1945 when Rutgers took it home. Lehigh never has won the weapon.

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Buckeyes, Bears Can Start Packing For Bowl Trip--IF

It's bowl-packing time again in college football and two of the juiciest post-season plums may be grabbed off this week at Ann Arbor, Mich., and Palo Alto, Calif.

Ohio State will meet Michigan, the defending titlist, for the big ten championship at Ann Arbor. Unbeaten, untied California will play improved Stanford at Palo Alto in the Pacific coast headline.

If both prevail in these important tests, the Buckeyes and Bears can start making traveling plans for Pasadena's Rose Bowl.

Pressure of the autumn grind continued to take its toll last week-end, with these important developments:

1. Cornell, Boston university and Wyoming were dumped from the ranks of the major unbeaten-untied teams, leaving only six in the select list: Notre Dame, Army, Oklahoma, California, Virginia and College of the Pacific.

2. Sixth-ranked Cornell and eighth-placed Michigan State saw their places in the first ten imperiled by upsets.

3. Top-rated Notre Dame, held to even terms for a half, exploded for four touchdowns in the final quarter to smother North Carolina, 42-6, while Army, No. 2 in the Associated Press rankings, barely squeaked past Pennsylvania, 14-13.

4. Bowl-bound Oklahoma hurdled one of its main obstacles to a perfect season by whipping Missouri, 27-7.

SAME RECORD
Ohio State and Michigan have similar records in the conference standings with four victories and one defeat. A loss for the Buckeyes would throw the Big Ten and the Rose Bowl picture into confusion.

Michigan, as a guest two years ago, is ineligible to return to Pasadena. The Wolverines won over Indiana Saturday, 20-7, while Ohio State trounced Illinois, 30-17.

California, only major team in the country unbeaten and untied for the last two seasons of regular play, continued its march by humbling Oregon, 41-14. Stanford, however, promises to be tough. The Indians walloped Southern Cal a week ago, 34-13 and Saturday romped over Idaho, 63-0.

UNBLEMISHED
Army became the only unblemished power in the East after Dartmouth surprisingly took the measure of Cornell, sixth in the national rankings, 16-7.

Boston university's Bowl hopes were stabbed if not punctured by Maryland, which won 14-13. Baylor put skids under Wyoming for the first time this year, 32-7.

Ranking with these upsets was Oregon State's 25-20 last period conquest of Michigan State.

Husky Pups Win 5th

SEATTLE, Nov. 14 (AP)—The University of Washington frosh crossed the goal line four plays after receiving the opening kickoff Saturday and went on to pile up a 36-0 victory over the Washington State college frosh.

The win left the Husky Pups undefeated in five games.

Leaders in the one-sided triumph were Quarterback Sam Mitchell, who completed 15 passes for 326 yards and three touchdowns, and Jack Nugent, halfback from Centralia, who romped for two tallies and had three others called back.

One of Mitchell's touchdown tosses was a 43-yard effort to Doug McClary, end from Olympia.

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OSC Turns In Upset Of Year

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 14 (AP)—Somebody should send this Oregon State college football team a golden slipper, suitably engraved.

The fire breathing outfit that knocked over Michigan State by a 25-20 count Saturday was a Pacific coast "poor relation" in September. Opponents considered their games with Oregon State the one thing better than drawing a bye.

But today the Cinderella team of Coach Kip Taylor leads the northern division of the Pacific Coast conference and is the only Far West outfit to put the slug on one of the nation's top ten.

Michigan State had looked so good losing to Notre Dame it was rated eighth last week.

And it looked to the crowd of 22,235 like the Oregon State Beavers were in for a classic manhandlout Saturday when Michigan State rolled to two touchdowns in the first 20 minutes. The Beavers had made just one gain—three yards.

Then Sophomore Quarterback Gene Morrow began mixing his plays and used just eight to cover 59 yards for an Oregon State touchdown. Trailing 13-7 as they came out of the start of the second half, the Beavers scored again—7 plays, 41 yards, 6 points. Stan McGuire missed his first placement try in 25 kicks, but the miss didn't hurt the Beavers.

McGuire was a rampaging demon for the rest of the game. He booted a field goal an official 22 yards—actually about 42—and blocked a Michigan State punt for a safety that gave OSC an 18-13 edge.

The Spartans' great right half, Lynn Chandross, put his team back in the game with a 51-yard gallop on a pass interception. Then Chandross skirted left end for a touchdown and Michigan State led again, 20 to 18.

Oregon State crashed 33 yards at the start of the final period to the winning counter, then put on one of the finest defensive shows seen on the West Coast this year. Its star was Halfback Bill Sheffield, who three times made spectacular interceptions of Spartan passes.

Kenny Carpenter scored twice on end runs and Dick Gray got the other on a pass. Everett Grandelius plunged to the first Michigan State touchdown and Frank Waters went a yard for the second.

The Southern California-Notre Dame football series, inaugurated in 1926, is the oldest on the 1949 Irish slate.

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 14 (AP)—Left End Darrell Robinson of Oregon set a new Pacific coast conference pass receiving record for one season in the game here Saturday with California.

He caught his 31st pass to top the old league record of 27 receptions set up last year by Oregon's Dick Wilkins.

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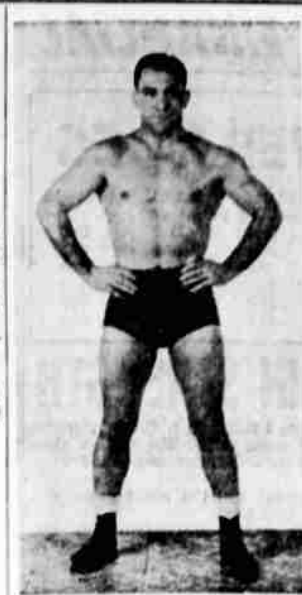

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20 Grid Teams Remain Unbeaten, Untied

NEW YORK, Nov. 14 (AP)—An even 20 college football teams still appeared today on the list of unbeaten and untied.

California has nine straight wins,

tallying 272 points to 100 by their opponents.

Six casualties were recorded the past week with the heart-breaker of them all being Boston university's setback by Maryland, 14-13, after winning its six previous games.

Wyoming took a crushing 32-7 licking from Baylor for its first loss in nine starts. Cornell, stopped at seven straight, was dumped by

Dartmouth, 16-7. The Valley City (N.D.) Teachers, after winning eight in a row, were crushed by St. Ambrose, still boasting a perfect record in eight games, 28-6.

Henderson State (Ark.) had its skinn ended at seven by Arkansas Tech, 26-0, and Middle Tennessee State, after capturing six consecutive contests, was held to a 7-7 tie by Murray.

Highest scoring team is that of

College of Pacific with 367 points to its opponents' 66 in eight victorious outings. Mighty Army, which barely squeaked through Saturday with a 14-13 triumph over Penn, has the second highest point total of 316.

Gannon college (Pa.) made it six straight victories Friday by defeating Loras, 19-7, but lost the distinction of being the only team whose goal line had not been crossed.

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
