Dr. J. C. Hunt will be among the city milk inspectors, fieldmen of fluid milk plants, mayors, city managers and milk plant operators and managers of all cities having their own milk inspection service who will attend the milk sanitation seminar in Portland November 16-18.

The three-day seminar will consider mainly matters of sanitation for dairy farms and milk plants as they relate to the state and municipal milk codes. Dr. Hunt said probably no major changes in the sanitation code for Klamath Falls would result since this area is under a city ordinance governed by the state code.

Pumping Motors Bid Accepted

The acceptance of low bid for installation of two large 700 horsepower pumping motors by C. W. Lane of Klamath Falls, was announced by the bureau of reclamation today. Motors will be installed at pumping plant D, where water is pumped from Tulelake to Lower Klamath lake. Lane submitted a low bid of \$3462. The Tulelake electric company submitted the second low bid of \$3472.55. Jensen and Mangs of Tulelake bid \$4490, and Delmonty electric of Oakland bid \$4837. Installation will start in about two weeks, reclamation officials said.

Mrs. Phelps, Yreka, Dies

YREKA—The death of Mrs. Clara Barnum Phelps, 94-year-old pioneer of Siskiyou county and a Linkville, Ore., bride of 1880, removed one of the eldest residents of this area. Mrs. Phelps died at Siskiyou General hospital Saturday night. She had been a patient since last August.

Mrs. Phelps was born in St. Joseph, Mo., June 24, 1855, and crossed the plains at the age of four with her parents, Eli and Mary Ann Barnum who settled in Little Shasta valley east of Yreka. She was the last survivor of 10 children.

Education As a young girl, Mrs. Phelps attended San Jose State college and following her graduation taught school at both Little Shasta and Oak Bar in the 70's, traveling by horseback in the sparsely settled country.

She was married in 1880 at Linkville, (now Klamath Falls), to Charles S. Phelps. For some time the couple lived in Lakeview and Mrs. Phelps also taught school there.

Mr. and Mrs. Phelps returned to Little Shasta in 1901, and lived there continuously until his death in 1938. He was a rancher.

With Daughter Since 1946, and until she entered the hospital, Mrs. Phelps made her home with a daughter, Mrs. Lorena Ward of Dorris. She leaves four children and 12 grandchildren.

Mrs. Phelps was highly interested in the Siskiyou County Historical society and frequently recounted stories of the family's trip across the plains, the encounter with Indians and wolves, and the early days of the settlers in Northern California.

Services will be held Wednesday at 2 p. m. from Girdner's chapel here.

Stocks Slip Then Steady

NEW YORK, Nov. 14 (AP)—Stock market prices took a midday slide today but steadied again at a level somewhat below last week's closing quotations.

Although trading activity picked up on the decline, there was no real attempt to test the strength of support for various groups. Total sales for the day ran around 1,300,000 shares.

Losses of fractions to a point were widespread. Gold mining shares again declined as there were further official assurances that no change in the gold price was planned. Stocks of automobile producers, yet to feel the full impact of steel shortages, were under mild pressure. Steel issues gave up fractions.

Principal losers included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, General Motors, U. S. Rubber, Dome, Santa Fe, Union Pacific, International Paper, Du pont and General Electric.

First Degree Murder Charge In Frat Death

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 14 (AP)—A first degree murder charge was filed today against James D. Heer, an Ohio State university freshman, who killed a fraternity brother after a homecoming party.

The 20-year-old student and ex-marine pleaded innocent and was held for the grand jury without bond.

Detective Sgt. Lowell V. Sheets, who filed the charge, said the shooting followed an argument with a girl friend and a reprimand from fraternity brothers.

The girl friend, Joyce Frafton, 22, Cleveland, was arraigned as a material witness and her bond was continued at \$300.

Detective Sheets expressed belief that Heer's argument with Miss Frafton, who had come here for a fraternity homecoming party, was a possible "key" to the developments which followed.

The officer, after questioning the 20-year-old Ohio State university freshman, reported Heer said he was "going to get a gun and start out on a criminal orgy."

James T. McKeown, 21, a senior and managing editor of the university's student daily, was shot to death early Saturday when he tried to take a .45 caliber automatic pistol from Heer.

The shooting, which occurred in front of the Delta Tau Delta fraternity house, followed a fraternity cocktail party and dance.
