Road Back

Business, Industry Rushing Return to Normal Activities

NEW YORK, Nov. 14 (AP)—Business and industry started a slow upward climb late last week after one of the worst labor tussles in recent history eased to an end, at least temporarily.

Steel mills were cut into production in an ever increasing number; coal was coming to the surface from countless mines; railroad crews were hustling around shops and yards preparing to resume normal schedules.

How Bad? Reports from the coal fields themselves indicate the miners have also become restive under the enforced idleness.

Ending of the steel strike came just in time to prevent drastic cut-backs in industry. Automobile makers were laying off workers by the thousands at the end of the week.

Both hopes and fears concerning the coal situation were bound up in the unpredictable John L. Lewis, who surprised the nation on Wednesday.

The World Today

There would be no surprise at the disclosure by diplomatic authorities in Washington that Britain has decided to recognize the Chinese Communist government; the signs have been pointing in that direction for some time.

The British Far Eastern experts believe that Nationalist China is incapable of further effective resistance to the conquering Red military machine. Therefore England will be taking the "practical" viewpoint in granting recognition to protect her great Chinese interests.

London is said to plan de facto recognition by the end of the year. Whether the United States will follow suit remains to be decided. Washington holds the view that there still is much Chinese territory which the Red armies haven't overrun.

It is true that Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek has created a powerful defensive position on the big island of Taiwan (Formosa) off the Southeast coast of China. He might be able to withstand a long siege.

This is the picture right now; the long range position may be a bird of another color. It's one thing to subdue China by force and another to keep its some half billion people in hand and develop such a huge country economically.

For if the Chinese communists fail to carry out their program of industrialization, thereby lifting the Chinese standard of living and easing the economic hardships which generate the raw power of revolutions, the chances are good that the Chinese Communist regime will either go down or have its character so drastically changed as to remain Communist perhaps in name only.

For advanced industrialization is the prerequisite to the socialization of both industry and agriculture and without such dynamic changes the Communist movement in China will soon lose its virility and unity as did the Nationalist Kuomintang phase of the "Chinese revolution."

This means the Reds will have a long term, uphill job to do. It is precisely because of this that the Nationalists are hanging on until the last ditch is lost.

Oregon, Washington Per Capita Relief Ahead of California

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—Washington and Oregon spent more per resident for general assistance in 1948 than did their reputedly wealthier neighbor, California.

The figures include old age assistance, aid to dependent children and aid to the blind.

Washington's aid to dependent children in 1948 totaled \$3,251,000 (M), of which federal funds amounted to \$299,000 (T) and state funds to \$1,625,000 (M) while local funds were \$627,000 (T).

Washington's aid to dependent children totaled \$9,917,000 (M), of which the federal government contributed \$2,746,000 (M) and the state \$7,171,000 (M).

California's old age assistance totaled \$131,524,000 (M) with federal funds amounting to \$38,384,000 (M) or 29.2 per cent, state funds \$62,730,000 (M) or 47.7 per cent while local funds amounted to \$10,410,000 (M) or 7.9 per cent.
