

Farm Bureau Seeks Retention of Rural Votes in Legislature

LA GRANDE, Nov. 15 (AP)—The Oregon Farm Bureau federation opened convention sessions today with a campaign to retain rural voting power in the state legislature at the head of the program.

The resolutions committee was told yesterday to draft policies aimed at "protection of rural voting power" against inroads of growing city electorates.

Three specific resolutions were

suggested by the house of delegates. They were:

1—Require signatures of initiative and referendum petitions to be representative of all sections of the state;

2—All bills of initiative measures should be accompanied by revenue provisions cleared by the state tax commission;

3—Opposition to any reapportionment of the legislative districts that would "limit or divide" the voting power of rural Oregon.

Vote on resolutions comes up Thursday. Barry Brownell, Milwaukie, was named committee chairman.

New Units

C. C. Elliott, Lakeview, Dies Unexpectedly

LAKEVIEW—Charles Coatsworth Elliott died suddenly at his home in Lakeview Sunday, November 13. Born October 28, 1868 at Eldorado Springs, Mo., Mr. Elliott was 81 years and 15 days of age at death.

A resident of Lakeview for about 20 years, Mr. Elliott had been a carpenter most of his life, although he was a teacher as a young man. On February 4, 1904, in Cedar County, Mo., he was married to Sally Eddleman who preceded him in death last February 12.

Survivors

Mr. Elliott is survived by four sons: Sheriff Thomas S. Elliott of Lake county; Euell and Alvas Elliott of Lakeview; and Sam Elliott of John Day; by one daughter, Mrs. Clarence Gaylord of Portland; by two brothers, J. S. Elliott of Eldorado Springs, Mo., and William Elliott of Fresno, Calif.; and by seven grandchildren. He was a member of the Baptist church.

Funeral services will be conducted at 2 p. m. Wednesday, November 17, from the First Baptist church in Lakeview with Rev. Carlton Babbidge, pastor of the church, officiating. Interment will be in Sunset Park cemetery at Lakeview.

William Canton Sr., chairman of the Memorial Park cemetery committee, said that John Lee, cemetery superintendent, will be able to determine the exact location of young Johnson's grave when the work on the section is finished.

Some six inches of lawn dirt is being spread over the section in preparation for lawn-seeding next summer.

Thomas Offers Fire Truck Routing Plan

City Engineer E. A. Thomas submitted a report to the council last night on probable plans for routing of fire trucks on Main street.

Thomas said that if trucks were to be dispatched to Main street via Wall and Esplanade, it would be necessary to place a red-flashing light at Wall and Esplanade and a warning siren at Esplanade and Main.

Thomas said that it would be advisable to widen Wall street and round off the west corner of the Wall and Broad street intersection, if this plan is adopted. This project would cost approximately \$2100 plus the purchase price of 1800 square feet of property on the corner.

An alternative plan was suggested by Thomas entailing widening of Broad street at an estimated cost of \$1065.

After considering the two propositions the city fathers spoke in favor of instituting the Wall-to-Esplanade-to-Main route.

They instructed Thomas to negotiate for purchase of the property in question and report back to the council.

Covered Vets' Grave Will Be Restored

One grave in a veterans' section of Klamath Memorial cemetery has been covered over by recent fill work on the section, but the grave will be located and marked within a week or 10 days.

A member of the city cemetery committee emphasized the grave was not lost, that its location by measurement was taken before the fill work began, and the government marker which will go over the plot is safe in an equipment shed.

The grave in question is that of Meryl G. Johnson, who died May 26, 1945, on Okinawa and whose body was brought back to the United States and buried here last May 7.

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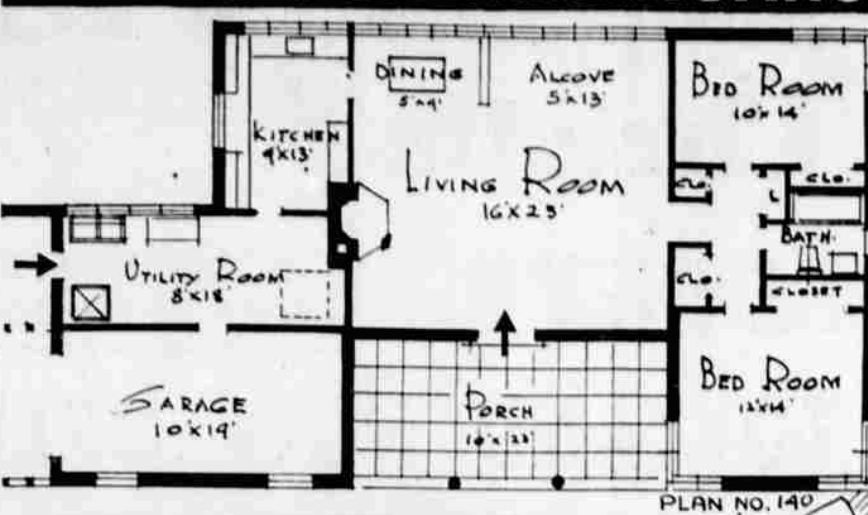
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HOMES FOR AMERICANS



IN CONTEMPORARY STYLE, this house is designed for a level property with its rear window wall facing south to take advantage of auxiliary solar heat. A movable low cabinet for china and linen on one side and books on the other side separates the dining area from the rest of the large living room. An inside chimney serves both living room fireplace and heater in utility room, where laundry has direct access to drying yard. Clerestory windows above the porch add to light in the living room and aid ventilation by drawing off warm air under the ceiling. Bedrooms have corner windows and large closets. This is plan 140 by Paul T. Haagen, architect, 59 East Van Buren St., Chicago 5, Ill. It has 1335 square feet of livable area with 275 square feet of porch.

Students of Many Nations Attending State Colleges

EUGENE, Nov. 14 — Forty-two Chinese and 35 Canadians head the list of 178 foreign students attending institutions of the state system of higher education this fall. In addition registrars have counted at least 50 Hawaiian and Alaskan students.

Oregon State college has 102 foreign students from 25 countries; University of Oregon, 63 from 21 countries; Eastern Oregon College of Education, 6 from 4 South American countries; Southern Oregon College of Education, 4 from Germany, England and Scotland; Vanport Extension Center, 3 from Japan, Peru and France.

Most western European and South American countries are represented. Eight students from India are attending Oregon State. Iran, Iraq, Pakistan and Siam have students in the state schools and several come from Africa.

Fellowships, scholarships and the re-education program of the army are responsible for bringing many

Recreation's Teen-Age Control OK'd

Full approval was given by the city council last night to the recreation department's control over teen-age club activities.
