Army Service School Here Tomorrow

CAA Seeks Airport Area Zoning

City Attorney Henry Perkins informed the council last night that an attorney and engineers representing the CAA will arrive in Klamath Falls from Seattle on Wednesday. The purpose of their visit is to instigate proceedings with the city and county for zoning of the Klamath Falls municipal airport district. Perkins advised. Perkins stated that the zoning will be done under an act of the legislature adopted in 1947, and that the local airport is the first to be chosen by the CAA in carrying out the zoning law. Under the new law restrictions are set up as to the height of buildings surrounding the airport for a distance of two miles. At the request of the CAA representatives a joint meeting will be held Wednesday with city officials, county commissioners and the airport commission.

23 Years Ago

Monday, November 15, 1926—Final plans for Klamath's first potato show, December 7, 8, 9, were laid Saturday afternoon at a meeting of the agricultural committee of the chamber of commerce with C. A. Henderson, county agent. The show, designed to advertise Klamath potatoes, to maintain the present high standard of quality and build up the potato industry, is sponsored by the Klamath potato growers and the agricultural committee of the chamber.

Tuesday, November 16, 1926—Resignation of A. W. Schaupp, deputy district attorney, was formally accepted Saturday afternoon by District Attorney E. L. Elliott. Mr. Schaupp's resignation was submitted to the county prosecutor one week ago. He gave press of private business as reason for resigning.

Wednesday, November 17, 1926—Klamath Falls' vision of a beautiful city park, second to none in the state of Oregon, has become a reality. Last night at a meeting of the city park board, Rufus S. Moore, Clara Moore and Mary L. Moore, widow of the late Charles Moore, Sr., gave to the city of Klamath Falls 114 acres of land, some within and some without the city limits, to be used as a city park.

Thursday, November 18, 1926—Two former gridiron warriors, each stars on his own team, leave tomorrow morning for the north to satisfy a desire which has been growing by leaps and bounds to see two real football games this season. They are Fire Chief Keith Ambrose and Mayor-Elect Thomas B. Watters, who plan to attend the Oregon-O.A.C. game at Corvallis next Saturday, and a week later, the Washington University - Nebraska game in Seattle.

Friday, November 19, 1926—Black was his color and black were his deeds, but his murderous raids among the dairy cattle of Frank McCormack's ranch, only three and one-half miles northwest of Klamath Falls, are now a thing of the past. He was a huge black bear, a meat killer and an omnipresent menace to the prosperous farm community so close to the city limits. He had ravaged the fat dairy herd of McCormack and carried away two calves bodily to his lair near the north end of little Wocus marsh. The killer was slain by F. Little, McCormack's employe.
