

Mrs. Piatt Home From 'Vacation'

BREMERTON, Wash., Nov. 16 (AP)—It was "just like coming home from a vacation" for Mrs. Wilford Piatt today.

Mrs. Piatt rejoined her husband and their two children after Piatt raised her \$1000 bond on a forgery charge growing out of what she said was an attempt to "liquidate" her over-ambitious husband.

Birthday

Today is the eighth birthday anniversary for Jimmy, the youngest, and Mrs. Piatt baked him a birthday cake while daughter Sherry, 14, looked on.

Mrs. Piatt, 31, is out on bond pending arraignment on a charge of forgery. She is accused of signing her husband's name in the \$1200 sale of the family automobile.

She had made the \$324 down payment to one of two men who were to kill her husband, she told authorities. The plot was discarded and it was agreed she would sell the auto and finance Hollis D. Scott, 23, former private detective, and herself in going east.

But when she was left on the dock in Seattle with only \$20 of the automobile proceeds, and no Scott, she telephoned her husband and told Piatt all about it in ex-piation.

Police were called in, and Scott and Wallis Mottern, 22, were charged with grand larceny by embezzlement.

Both Scott and Mottern told authorities they had no intention of going through with the slaying.

Superior Judge H. G. Sutton Monday sustained a defense plea for dismissal of an attempted murder charge against Mrs. Piatt, but Prosecutor James Munro said he would ask the state supreme court to reverse that decision.

Meanwhile, at home, Mrs. Piatt told her former navy yard worker-husband:

"This is just like getting home from a vacation."

Group Formed To Combat Car Shortage

PORTLAND, Nov. 16 (AP)—A campaign to end future boxcar shortages along Southern Pacific tracks was announced last night by a newly formed Western Oregon Shippers Car Supply committee.

R. E. Titus, executive vice president of Western Forest Industries association, said committeemen are being elected in five districts. He said cannery, fresh fruit and grain shippers had been asked to join the lumbermen.

Titus said this year's situation should be eased soon, but the committee was looking to the future years. "We feel we need a permanent solution to the shortage that seems to recur in Western Oregon every fall," he said.

Elections of committeemen were under way in Grants Pass, Roseburg, Eugene, Corvallis and Northern Oregon districts, he said. A meeting is planned for tomorrow night at Coos Bay by the chamber of commerce.

Titus said the committee would carry its case to the interstate commerce commission. Rep. Harris Ellsworth, Roseburg, had said earlier this fall he would ask the ICC to check into boxcar allotments for Oregon. Lumber mills and some grain and fruit shippers have been complaining of the shortage of cars.

W. E. Hamilton, picked up Sunday morning and charged with drunken driving will have a chance to plead in police court before Judge Victoria Thaler Saturday morning.

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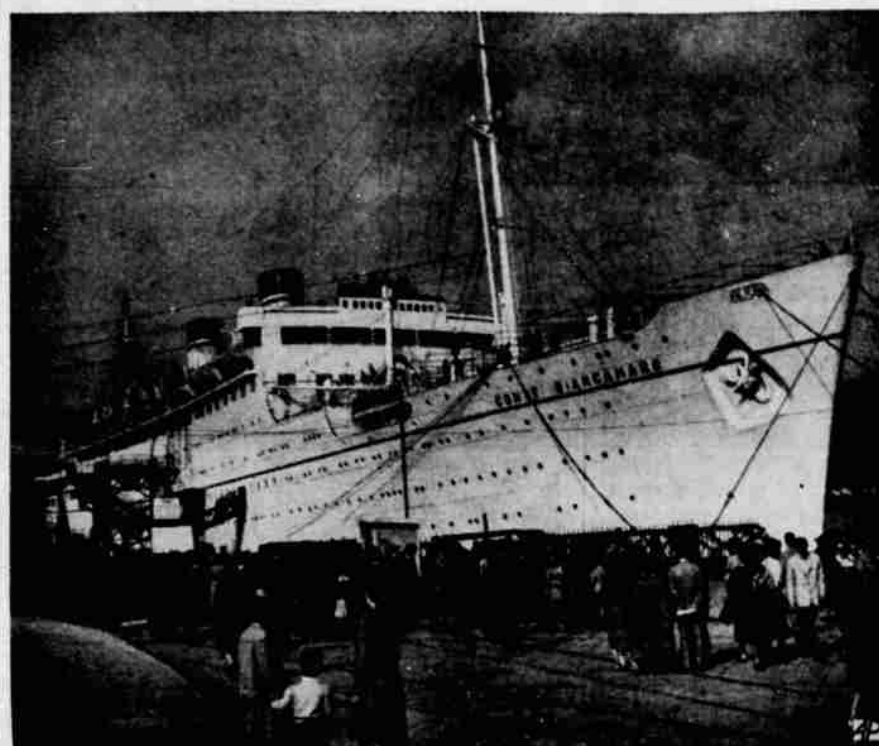

Special Jet Show For Bedfast Vet

SEDRO WOOLLEY, Wash., Nov. 16 (AP)—A "command performance" of a couple of 625-mile an hour F-84 air force Thunderjet fighters was put on today for a World War II flyer who has been flat on his back since being shot down over Italy in 1944.

Sherman Anderson, the captain who was shot down, watched the performance from his bedroom window after Col. Clinton D. Vincent arranged the special showing.

Anderson recently wrote Vincent, commanding officer of the 25th air

division (defense) at Silver Lake, near Everett, Wash.

"I have never seen a jet plane, except in photos and drawings," he told Vincent.

The colonel arranged for the Thunderjets to whisk past Anderson's window.

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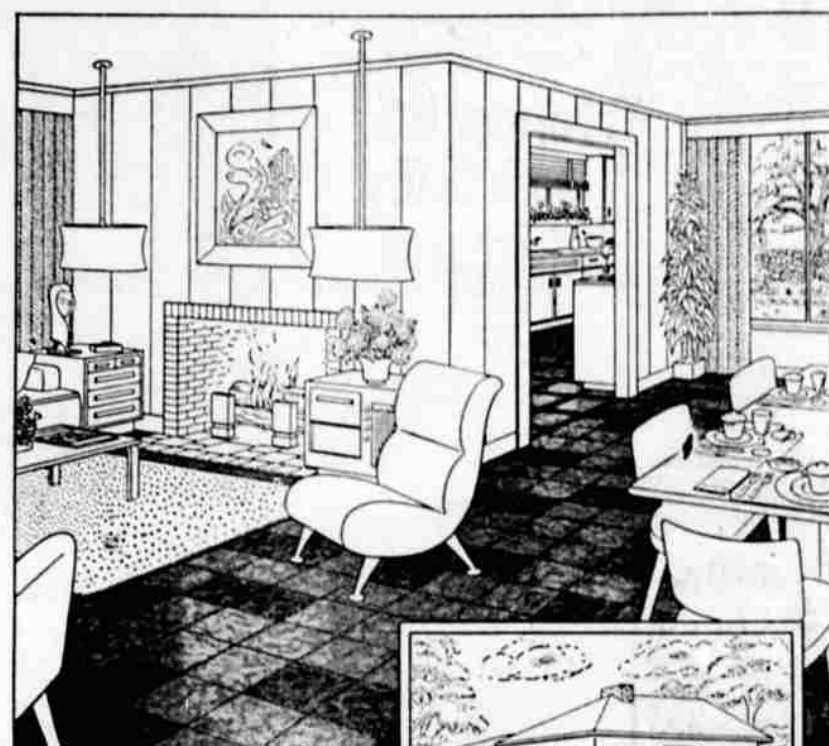
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
