

Newspapers Rap Solons About Swedes

TULSA, Okla., Nov. 16 (AP)—The Tulsa Tribune, commented editorially yesterday on Oklahoma Sen. Elmer Thomas' dispute with Sweden as follows:

"Since Senator Thomas voted both for the RCA appropriations and the arms-for-Europe Bill, the Swedes probably figured that he already knew about Sweden's position in the war. If Senator Thomas is surprised at what he found, the Swedes are justifiably surprised at his surprise."

"New York Papers Pull Senator Thomas by the Ear" and "Acid American Press Comment Against Junketing Senators" were dominant headlines in two of the biggest Stockholm papers.

New York Herald Tribune's editorial about "Congressional Innocents Abroad" who "might learn to save their little tempers until they return to the capitol" was front page news in the social democratic newspaper Aftonbladet.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—President Truman plans to fly to Key West, Fla., November 28 for a three week stay.

Presidential Press Secretary Charles G. Ross gave out this word officially, confirming reports that have circulated for several weeks.

He said Mrs. Truman and their daughter, Margaret, probably will be in Key West for at least part of the three weeks.

Artificial Larynx For Mutes

MELBOURNE, Australia, (AP)—An engineer and his doctor have worked together to perfect a chromium larynx which gives speech to mute people.

Ten years ago, Harry Shannon, the engineer, had his larynx removed and was told he would never speak again. But he made a thorough study of the larynx and used his engineering skill to make an artificial articulator. His first important clue was the discovery that the vocal chords produce a constant tone, which is modulated by use of the lips and teeth. When in use, his chromium gadget which resembles an inhaler, is held in one hand, one end of the tube being connected to an aperture in the throat and the other slipped between the teeth.

Now Harry Shannon talks like any normal person. By changing from one articulator to another, he produces the voice of a baritone or a soprano, while he even has what he calls a "roarer" for cheering at football matches and a "whisperer" for more confidential moments. The artificial larynx has brought speech back to many other mute Australians.

Textbooks Talk Back In Van Nuys

VAN NUYS, Calif., (AP)—They have the cutest textbooks at the adult education class in Van Nuys evening high school. Textbooks with pigtailed, ribboned and flashing eyes. They chirp gleefully to their readers. Children are the texts and their mothers are the students.

The class, called pre-school observation, studies the youngsters and seeks answers to common problems of child rearing. It's full and has a waiting list. The mothers, 44 of them with more than 80 children, meet weekly to observe their offspring at play, take notes, ask questions and discuss day-to-day growth problems.

The children ages two to five have swings, slides, a merry-go-round and books. Periods are set aside for painting, stories, singing, dancing, rest, crackers and tomato juice.
