Chemical Halts Weeds By Soil Sterilization

Here is another instance of a modern chemical doing a job easier, quicker and better than the old-time, hand methods. This chemical, arsenic trioxide, kills weeds and also sterilizes the soil so no plant growth occurs for a year or two. In addition, it has been found that this chemical method is also cheaper than hand hoeing and gives more thorough, longer-lasting weed control.

Many industrial, civic and agricultural organizations are now using arsenic trioxide for controlling weeds as this reduces fire hazards and lowers fire protection costs.

Non-Inflammable

Arsonic trioxide is non-inflammable and weeds treated with it have a fire resistant value. It does not rust iron or steel.

Arsonic trioxide can be used around lumberyards, warehouses, buildings, and industrial yards; around tanks containing inflammable materials; along fire breaks, fence lines and rights-of-way. It can also be used to clear off weeds and prevent regrowth on dirt and gravel roads, paths, trails, parade grounds, driveways and similar places.

Easy Season

Arsonic trioxide is highly toxic to vegetation and when applied to the soil in the proper dosage, retains weed-killing power for a long time. It can be applied at any time of the year but the best weed control is obtained when it is applied at the start of the rainy season when weeds and grasses are starting. An application at this time kills the young weeds and the weed seeds not yet germinated and also sterilizes the soil. Then, "spot" treatments can be made seasonally or annually to prolong weed control indefinitely.

For application, low pressure (100 to 150 lbs.) power equipment is recommended, although sprinkling carts may be used or, for small areas, a sprinkling can may be used.

Caution

There's one caution to bear in mind—arsenic trioxide is a weed killer—it sterilizes the soil, it should not be applied within the "drip" areas and root-feeding areas of trees, shrubs, vines and other valuable plants.

Triox should not be applied where there is any danger of animals eating weeds that have been sprayed.

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Dairy Prices Continue Advances

The average Oregon price of whole milk has been making monthly advances from the low point reached in May, according to the weekly dairy markets review from OSC extension service.

The average butterfat price to Oregon farmers has held unchanged during the three month period ending October 15.

The wholesale price of milk is down 75 cents a hundred-weight compared to last October. Butterfat is down 7 cents a pound, but is 34 cents a pound under the top summer price a year ago in July. Oregon dairymen are receiving \$35 less per head for dairy cows than they received last October.

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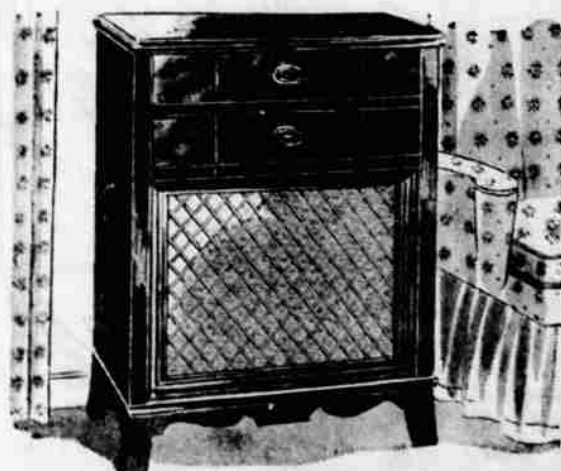
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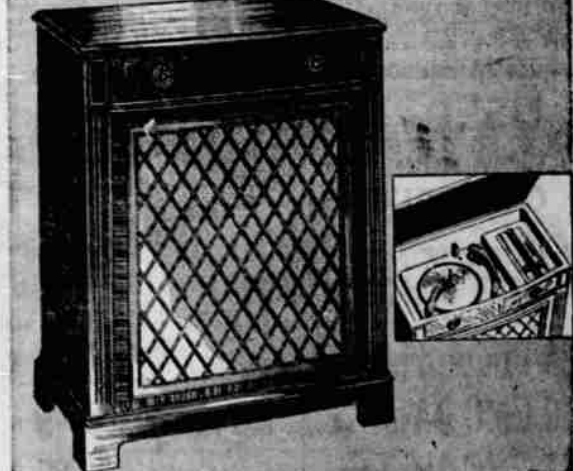
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
