

Farm Federation Seeks Legislature Patterned After Federal Congress

LA GRANDE, Nov. 17 (AP)—An initiative measure to change the state legislature to the federal system of house and senate membership was planned today by the Oregon farm bureau federation.

State Rep. Giles French, Moro, said the ballot measure for a constitutional amendment was being prepared. This followed a vote by the farm bureau's convention on the proposal.

The delegates favored re-portioning the legislative membership by population and giving each county two members in the state senate. Both houses are presently apportioned on a population basis — although not revised for recent changes — with membership limited to 60 in the house and 30 in the senate.

Opposition

The proposal resulted from earlier convention declarations to oppose any reapportionment that would deprive farm areas of their influence under the existing legislative system.

President Lowell Steen warned of a state property tax of up to 8 mills in 1951 unless the state found new revenue sources. He said state spending is excessive. He said Oregon had gone overboard on schools and pensions.

Executive Secretary Marshall Swearingen reported membership was up 700, but not to the goal. He said the federation should strive for a 50 per cent gain in 1950. This would put affiliation at 6470.

The associated women of the federation elected Mrs. Lester van Blockland, Island City, their president. Mrs. Orie Estoup, Milton, was elected vice president and Mrs. E. E. Kilpatrick, Klamath Falls, secretary-treasurer.

Footprinters Plan Drive For Courtesy

About 30 members of the Footprinters organization had dinner at Sari's last night. Sgt. E. W. Tichenor of state police was speaker of the evening and his talk concerned causes of traffic fatalities. The group voted to hold a dinner dance soon after Christmas.

Butte Rabbit Drive Sunday

More than two miles of fencing has been constructed making a funnel into a corral to use Sunday for a rabbit drive in Butte valley.

No guns or dogs will be allowed but anyone who can swing a club is invited, farmers sponsoring the drive said the party will meet at 10 a. m. at Mandocel.

The rabbits have become so numerous in Butte valley that they are threatening the crops in that area, farmers said.
