

## 10 Convicted of Mass Attack on Woman; Face \$150,000 Civil Action

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 18 (AP)—Convicted of the mass rape of a mentally unsound young mother, 10 Tacoma youths today still faced \$150,000 civil court damage actions brought by the woman's husband.

The superior court jury took only one ballot in finding nine of the youths guilty of rape and the tenth of attempted rape. The defendants range in age from 19 to 23 years.

They were convicted of taking part in an all-night sex orgy May

27 with Mrs. Marie Charlton, 21, and later turning her loose in the nude some miles from her home.

**Victim Dead**  
The young woman died in August at Western State hospital, Steilacoom, Wash., where she had been recommitted because of her mental condition.

Attorneys for the youths said the convictions would be appealed if a new trial is denied.

Court officials said the jury's verdict could bring terms up to 20 years or to life. The three defendants over 21 years all face minimum five-year terms.

No date of hearing has been set on the personal damage actions brought by the attack victim's husband, Pete Charlton. His separate suits, totaling \$150,000, allege that the youths' actions deprived him of the services of his wife.

The one defendant convicted of the lesser charge of attempted rape was Harry K. Christel. Testimony developed that he was physically unable to fulfill the act with Mrs. Charlton.

Other convicted youths are Lawrence H. Meyers, Donald W. Greco, Anders Lilja, Eric Lilja, Jack D. Kerth, Arthur N. Markstone, Robert C. O'Leary, Eugene Wick and Ronald W. Phillips.

## Bang's Disease Disappearing, Doctor Reports

PORTLAND, Nov. 18 (AP)—The bang's disease problem in Oregon dairy herds is lessening.

That was the report of Dr. Charles Haynes, state veterinarian, who said he was "proud of the way we have cleaned up the situation in Tillamook county."

Haynes said Tillamook dairymen have killed 52 cattle recently because of the infection, and he predicted that within two years the county would be accredited as free from the disease.

Sauvies Island farmers have promised to cooperate in a program to clean out infected herds there, Haynes added.

**Raise Own**  
He called upon dairymen to raise their own heifers, not buy them, as a means of controlling not only bang's disease, but also mastitis and tuberculosis.

"Too often when they buy cattle," he explained, "they buy a cow that has had a negative report on a test but which may be from an infected herd. It may have been exposed to the infection."

Haynes spoke to a milk sanitation seminar attended by some 70 Oregon and Washington health officers. They agreed to work for better milk, through elimination of infected herds and better dairy sanitation.

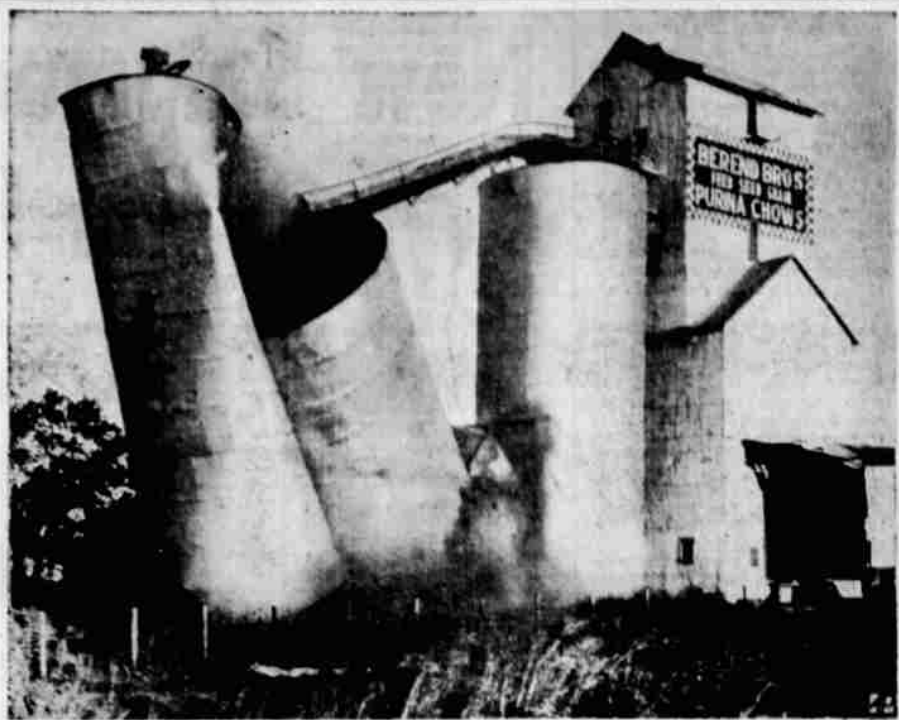
## HIGH SCHOOL News and Comments

## 115-Mile Wind Batters Guam; Damage May Run 'High in the Millions'

GUAM, Nov. 18 (AP)—This huge U. S. base today emerged battered and bruised from a typhoon with 115-mile winds or more which wrought damage possibly high in the millions.

No deaths were reported. There were few serious injuries.

The all-clear came at 9 a.m. after a night of howling winds, and the repair of the damage began. Both civilian and military property was hard hit. Communications have been partly restored.

Rear Adm. Edward C. Ewen, commander in the Marianas, said that damage was "very extensive."

Ewen's headquarters was badly hit, as were warehouses and quarters housing. A stockpile of paint at the marines' 8th service depot burned at the height of the storm.

**Heavy Damage**  
Reports of heavy damage came from the naval supply center, and Camp Wittek, home of the fleet marine force.

Two villages in the southern part of Guam were reported as much as 70 per cent destroyed. Emergency food and clothes were being trucked to that area.

(Reports to Tokyo said the winds undoubtedly were even higher in exposed areas of Guam. The southern part of the island was closer to the storm's center, which passed to the south of Guam.)
