RENO MAY JOIN FAR WEST

NEW YORK (AP)—The North Carolina fans weren't the only ones waving Confederate flags around New York in the past few days. Maryland's Jim Tatum turned up at yesterday's football writers' gabfest with an impassioned plea for "states' rights"—or rather, conference players. . . . Tatum's argument followed an old southern line—if we can't help the boys in our own way, the Big Ten will outbid us. . . . George Bauer, the Navy coach, figures the Army-Penn game turned out exactly the way Earl Blaik wanted it. The Cadets made enough mistakes and had a close enough call that Blaik can "needle" them right down to the Navy game. . . . Rip Engle of Brown claims his biggest mistake was getting an alumnus to scout Princeton during the week before the Bears lost their only game. When Rip arrived, he found the guy had been scouting the Princeton 150-pound team.

The Reno Silver Sox of the Sunbelt baseball league probably will be a part of the Far West circuit next season.

Directors of the Silver Sox have voted to withdraw from the Sunbelt and enter the Far West, and the club will be welcomed by the Far West with open arms.

Travel distance and expense were given as reason for the decision to take the Reno club out of the Sunbelt, directors said. As the Sunbelt loop has been constituted, Reno's nearest rival was Las Vegas, 450

miles away. Two other clubs of the circuit, Tijuana and Mexicali, were over 800 miles from Reno.

Other clubs in the Sunbelt are El Centro, Riverside, San Bernardino Porterville, all in California.

Current affiliates of the Far West include Klamath Falls and Medford in Oregon; Redding, Willows, Marysville and Pittsburg in California. One other club, probably in Oregon, is expected to join this winter.

Travel distance for the Reno club will be considerably less than in the Sunbelt, although

the Sox will have to tape a step down in classification. The Sunbelt is class C and the Far West class D.

Reno had a farm club agreement with the New York Giants for players the last three seasons, but that agreement has expired. Directors of the club have not determined what player arrangements will be made for next year.

The Cleveland Indians and other big league ball clubs have been reported anxious to get working agreements in the Far West since in the two years of its operation a number

of young ball players of exceptional promise have been developed.

In San Francisco, Jerry Donovan, president of the Far West wheel, said he was waiting word from Wayne Hinckley, president of the Silver Sox, officially informing him of the team's action and declared: "We'll be tickled to have them in our league."

Donovan said the Far West will take no action on admitting Reno until the Silver Sox are officially out of the Sunbelt. Until that time, he explained, the Far West must

adopt a "hands off" policy.

If the Sox do become a part of the Far West, the addition is expected to add a Klamath Fall-Reno rivalry to the league because of the comparatively close distance—less than 300 miles—and the great amount of travel between the two towns.

Scheduling probably would be worked out to allow the Reno club to play at Klamath Falls and Medford, then swing south through Redding and Willows.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 (AP)—Heading for the final weeks of the football season with an .809 average on 479 correct guesses and 114 stumbles. Last week's selections listed 73 correct and 14 incorrect for an aggregate of .839.

Here are this week's picks:

Notre Dame over Iowa: There was a time three decades ago when Notre Dame couldn't defeat Iowa. Now, apparently, the trend is reversed. The modern phase should continue another year.

Michigan over Ohio State: The home field gives the Wolverines what little advantage there is in this annual clash.

Minnesota over Wisconsin: Minnesota, which enjoyed a mental visit to the Rose Bowl in mid-season, needs a victory here to stay in the race for a real trip west. That should be enough of an incentive for a high-scoring game.

Stanford over California: It has been nothing but success for the Californians while Stanford has had its rough days. With the coast title and the western Rose Bowl invitation at stake, the Indians are the pick here although California generally is favored by as much as a touchdown.

Southern California over UCLA: The Trojans by a touchdown over their cross-town rivals.

Oklahoma over Santa Clara: The Sooners count their current winning streak from their loss to the Broncos a year ago. Oklahoma is after revenge.

Duke over North Carolina: The Tar Heels gave their best last Saturday and it is asking too much of them to come back with as much this week-end.

Rice over Texas Christian: Each club defeated Texas, Rice by two points, TCU by one. That gives Rice the edge.

BUMS BUY
MALLETTE

CINCINNATI, Nov. 18 (AP)—A total of \$182,500 changed hands for the second straight year in the annual baseball player draft here yesterday but the talent was a little cheaper this time. Twenty bush leaguers were selected in the 1949 draft, one more than in the grab last year.

All but two of the majors, Detroit of the American league and Boston of the National, made selections and Brooklyn claimed its first draftee in five years. The National league champs gave the nod to Malcolm Mallette, 26-year-old lefty, who had a 10-10 record last season while playing with Kansas City, Memphis and Sacramento.

Triple-A clubs were the big losers in the draft, giving up 15 of the 20 players selected. Seven were chosen from the Pacific coast league, five from the International and three from the American association.

Clubs have until midnight tonight to telegraph the office of Commissioner A. B. Chandler to make further draft selections.

The big league clubs paid \$10,000 for the players drafted from Triple-A clubs, \$7,500 for those from Double-A, \$5,000 for class A and \$4,000 for a class B draftee.

PCL Could Finish
In Three-Way Tie

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 18 (AP)—California's Golden Bear holds the center stage tomorrow as the next to last act of the annual Rose Bowl drama unfolds.

This is the act where the hero emerges triumphant from one deathless duel and then, with the spectators hanging on in profound suspense, charges on to the big finale which will be played at Pasadena New Year's Day. The villain of the piece, of course, is an as yet unidentified terrible one from the wilds of the Big Ten.

Yes, the Golden Bear holds the center stage, but whether he, a noble Stanford Indian, or just possibly a poor little Bruin from UCLA comes out as the shining hero is a matter that won't be decided until the script is played.

There is no doubt that the big Bear from Berkeley is the dominating character today. Nobody has whipped him yet, and he's favored by close odds to add the Stanford Indian to his list.

UNCHALLENGED—IF

If the Bear wins, he'll be the unchallenged hero who'll tackle the mauler from the Midwest.

If the Indian wins, or if the Indian wins and the Bruin also claws the Trojan Horse of Southern California, things will be in a pretty mess, and also tied up.

For each then will have defeated the other in a merry cycle—California having taken UCLA, UCLA having beaten Stanford, and Stanford the same to California, all in Pacific Coast conference competition.

The same holds true, of course, if Stanford beats Cal and UCLA loses. That leaves the two bay area enemies deadlocked.

A tie, then, will delay the situation until Monday, throwing the plot into a political theme and necessitating a vote by the conference members to select the Rose Bowl candidate.

A sellout throng of 90,000 is due to watch the Cal-Stanford scene, and 75,000 will be on hand here for UCLA and the Trojans.

There are other gripping side plots on tap, less vital but no less intriguing, for they bring together such traditional sectional rivals as Oregon and Oregon State at Eugene, and Washington State and Washington at Seattle. Idaho is idle and Montana entertains a non-conference foe, Brigham Young.
