Girl Suspect In Spy Case Must Be Tried

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 (AP)—Federal Judge Sylvester J. Ryan ruled today that Judith Coplon must stand trial with Russian Engineer Valentin Gubitchev on spy conspiracy charges.

Ryan denied a motion by the ex-government girl's lawyer, Archibald Palmer, to hold that the trial would put his client in double jeopardy—that is, put her on trial twice for the same offense.

Miss Coplon already has been convicted in Washington a similar charge involving the theft of official secrets for passing on to the Russians.

City Tries Another Park Meter

Still using Klamath Falls' Main street as a proving ground, the city has added a new type of parking meter between 5th and 6th—on a trial basis, of course.

About half a dozen different types of meters are now in use along Main street. All except the original Mark-Times are in on a trial basis while the city continues probing for likeable brands.

Two-Ways

The latest bunch are two-way affairs—one meter serves two cars, front and aft.

Billed by the manufacturing company, International Meters, Inc. of New York, as "the greatest innovation in metered parking control," the two-way timers are known in the trade as twin automatics. One meter post with a twin head serves two parking spaces.

Elephants

The theory is that at each meter two cars shall park front to rear like elephants in a parade, leaving clearance for sliding out at the front of one car and the rear of the other.

Installation costs, servicing and coin collection are supposed to be 50 per cent less than that of the single head meters most commonly used.

Eleven of the double-heads have been installed here, clocking 21 parking spaces. One, at a corner, is a single. The trial period is, according to the city, six months.

Applegate Funeral Here Today

Final rites for Elmer Ivan Applegate, 82-year-old Southern Oregon pioneer who died at Williams near Grants Pass Wednesday, were held here this afternoon at 1 o'clock from Whitlock's chapel and scores of old friends gathered to pay tribute to the elderly botanist.

Honorary pall bearers were Fred Peterson, Bert C. Thomas, E. M. Chilcote, Don Zumwalt, R. H. Dunbar, and E. B. Hall. Active were Cal Peyton, Hal Ogle, Don Fisher, Joe HEVANS, William Kuykendall and Adolph Nitschelm.

Interment was in IOOF cemetery, the Applegate family plot.

Botanist

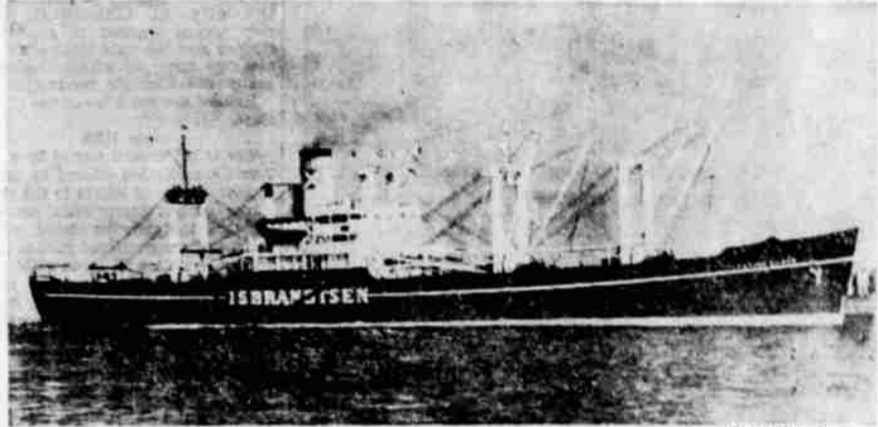
Interested in botany through his life, he became a nationally known authority on the genus erythronium, a delicate lily of the Northwest. The common names are dog-tooth violet or adder's tongue.

His collection of erythronium, valued at between \$1500 and \$2000, is now in the Dudley Herbarium at Stanford university where he held the courtesy title of curator from 1929 until his death. For several years after 1929, he spent much of his time at the herbarium working on his collection. After falling health forced him to give up this work, he made his home at Williams with his sisters, Minnie, (Mrs. C. C. Chitwood), Evelyn and Elsie.

Trucks Hit, Injured Man In Hospital

One cement laden truck crashed into another around 1 o'clock this morning on the fog shrouded crossing of the Dorris-Hatfield cut-off near Tulelake, and sent 30-year-old Hubert Alcorn of Tulelake to Klamath Valley hospital with multiple injuries.

Alcorn's condition was reported fair this morning but report of X-rays will determine injuries, hospital attendants said.

California highway patrolmen investigated and said that Alcorn and his partner in the trucking business, Paul J. Ruttmann, 32, Tulelake, were Tulelake bound from San Francisco with two trucks, both heavily loaded with sacked cement.

Man Trapped

Ruttmann either slowed down or stopped in the fog, and Alcorn's truck plowed into the rear of the forward machine. Alcorn was pinned between the two loads of cement. The Tulelake ambulance moved him to Klamath Falls.

A wrecker was called to clear the highway which was blocked from the time of the crash until mid-morning.

Amateur Radio Course Offered

OTI—Interest in amateur radio is being stimulated by the establishment, at Oregon Technical Institute, by a night course in amateur operation. In response to many requests from local men and women OTI will conduct a three-month course in radio code and theory, based on the federal communications commission requirements for an amateur operator's license.

Classes will begin as soon as 15 students have been enrolled, and will be held two nights a week in the radio building. There will be one hour of code and another of theory, nightly. The course is open to the public and those securing a "Ham" license will be permitted to operate the school amateur station.

G. T. McDonald Dies After Long Illness

George Thomas McDonald, 76, long time resident of Klamath Falls and Klamath county jailer during World War II years, died at Hillside hospital Thursday morning following a lengthy illness.

Mr. McDonald served on the city police force for many years under Chief Guy Merrill and other heads of that department. He was a veteran of the Spanish-American War and moved to Klamath Falls 39 years ago. His birthplace was San Soutel, N. C.

Final rites will be held Saturday at 11 a. m. from Whitlock's chapel with the following serving as pall bearers, Lloyd L. Low, Marjion Barnes, A. H. Weatherford, P. D. Reeder, Guy Merrill and Dale Mattoon. Interment will be in Klamath Memorial park. Dr. Martindale Woods will officiate.

Mother Fails To Save Son From Gallows

WALLA WALLA, Nov. 18 (AP)—A mother's vain mile-consuming efforts to keep her son from walking the "last mile" failed last night and early today Wayne L. Williams was hanged for the slaying of his wife.

He was pronounced dead at 12:16 a. m. after being carried to the gallows strapped to a board. He had refused to walk and resisted as the black mask was placed over his face.

'Desperate'

The snap of the trap-door brought to an end the desperate bid of Williams' mother Mrs. Nora Williams Everett, to stay the execution. Contending that her son had been insane for some time before moving to Washington from Tulsa, Okla., she appealed to the state supreme court in Olympia, and then to lower courts at Walla Walla, Pasco and Yakima by application for a writ of habeas corpus. All were denied.

Convicted

Williams, 32, was convicted of bludgeoning his wife, Hallie Lucille, 27, with a rock, then pushing her body over a steep cliff overlooking Puget Sound near Mukitoe on June 17, 1948.

His four-year-old daughter, Mary Bernice, also was beaten and pushed over the precipice but survived.

Sullen

Morose and sullen, Williams refused religious counsel. He said nothing. His face was white and he clenched his big hands tightly as he went to his death. He had only dabbled with his "final meal"—Mulligan stew and fried chicken.

Czech Anti-Red Purge Continues

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Nov. 18 (AP)—A Prague state court announced the smashing of a big spy ring today as it sent 35 Czechs to prison for sentences ranging from life to one year. They were convicted of aiming to overthrow the Communist government.

The group included two former members of the Czechoslovak security police. Three of the accused were women.

The court charged them with spying for an unnamed Western power, with the goal of trying to overthrow the Czech government.

The trial, which lasted eight days, was one of a series of treason trials going on virtually non-stop in Czechoslovak courts. Most of them are held in secret.
