Split-up Refuted

OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 19 (AP)—The Pacific Coast conference never has entertained the idea of splitting into northern and southern divisions for the football season, or dropping Montana and Idaho from the schedule.

H. P. (Dick) Everest, conference president, quieted both rumors yesterday and labeled them "street corner talk." He said neither idea ever had been discussed by conference officials.

Several California sports writers and commentators have advocated dividing the circuit on the theory that northern schools do not offer enough competition to Stanford, California, UCLA and Southern California.

But Everest, the University of Washington faculty representative to the conference, said such a plan is the last thing the California member schools want. He pointed out that although the California "Big Four" won every game this season against the north, Oregon was co-champion last year and Oregon State finished second in 1947.

The conference winter meeting will be held in Carmel, Calif., December 11-13.

TIGERS WHITEWASH PELS

Playoff Chances Bobbled

LA GRANDE, Nov. 19 (Special)—The La Grande Tigers turned loose a slashing fullback named Wayne Berry on the Klamath Falls Pelicans to blast out a 31-0 victory and squelch any chance the Pels might have had of gaining the state high school football championship.

It was the second time in three seasons the Pels tumbled out of the state grid playoff in the quarterfinal round. In 1947 The Dalles got a decision over Klamath in the opening game of playoff action.

La Grande moves up to play Marshfield next week in the semifinals.

The Pelicans were a far shout last night from the team that had swept through to the district 2 title. They never threatened a score and only once penetrated as deep as the Tiger 35 yard line. That was late in the fourth quarter.

La Grande scored first when the game was barely two minutes old, cashing in on a fumble on the third running play of the tilt. Gene Carlson fumbled and Berry recovered on the Pel 21. Two plays later Fullback Berry cracked over from the 16.

Bobby Gilbert missed the conversion try. Gilbert failed to convert on all of La Grande's first four tries, then relinquished the chore to Chuck Brackett who booted the extra point on the fifth.

La Grande's second score, late in the first quarter, was strung at the end of an 80-yard drive in 13 plays. Quarterback Franz Haun sneaked over from the 1.

The third tally came in the waning moments of the second quarter, culminating a 35-yard drive when Haun passed to Berry in the end zone nine yards away.

In that first half the Pels showed only one spark, a 35-yard run from scrimmage by Joe Nichols that put the ball just across the midfield stripe where the Tigers promptly held for downs.

The third quarter went scoreless but the Tigers exploded for a pair of touchdowns in the fourth, by way of clinching things.

Nichols stopped one drive when he intercepted a pass at the Pelican goal and ran it out to the 8. But plays later Gaylor Huckle bobbled a pitchout and Charles Stine recovered on the 8 for La Grande.

Grant, Hillsboro, Pirates Move Out Toward Grid Title

PORTLAND, Nov. 19 (AP)—It will be La Grande vs. Marshfield and Hillsboro vs. Grant of Portland in the semi-final playoffs for the Oregon state prep football championship.

The four squads won the coveted berths last night in quarter-final contests marked by fog, a tie, and an upset.

Grant High, gunning for a fourth state crown, performed the expected feat by downing Central Catholic of Portland, 14-0.

Hillsboro, playing in such a heavy fog that the fans couldn't see across the gridiron, overcame Milwaukee, 13-6 — Hillsboro's second victory over the Milwaukee Maroons this season.

Marshfield, which beat Eugene decisively just two weeks ago, barely squeaked by the Eugene axemen in the playoff clinch. The squads battled to a 6-6 tie, but Marshfield's nine first downs to Eugene's four gave the coastal squad the semi-final berth.

But it was the contest which was supposed to be the closest that turned out the walkaway. The La Grande Tigers, who had beaten all their opponents so decisively that no one realized how good they were, smashed the favored Klamath Falls Pelicans, 31-0.

The Pelicans never even got started. They opened the game with a fumble, which La Grande promptly converted into a touchdown. They gained a total of little more than 100 yards, and not until the fourth quarter did they reach their deepest penetration; the Tiger 38.

La Grande, which had won all its season games so effortlessly that dolesters assumed there hadn't been much competition, romped repeatedly to the goal behind the smooth-working combination of Quarterback Frank Haun and Fullback Wayne Berry.

Haun scored one touchdown on a quarterback sneak; passed twice for others. Berry plunged to two touchdowns, and scored a third when he caught one of Haun's scoring passes.

The Marshfield-Eugene tie classed as a surprise, too, but it wasn't quite as unexpected.

The Eugene Axemen, keyed up for the crucial contest, scored in the second period on Merritt Barber's spectacular 74-yard run; then two touchdowns.

TOP PLACE STAKED AT NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Nov. 19 (AP)—The second-place New York Yankees will have a double incentive when they attempt to submerge Cleveland's All-America Football conference champions at Yankee stadium tomorrow.

Not only will first place be at stake, but Coach Red Strader's New Yorkers will be seeking their first victory over the pacesetter Bronx in 10 league and playoff clashes since the circuit began in 1946.

The Yankees' best showing against the champs was a 28-26 tie on November 23, 1947. In one meeting this year, Cleveland won, 14-3.

The Brown can virtually clinch first place by beating the boys from the Bronx. They are eyeing their fourth straight conference championship.

Eight games are on the pro grid schedule tomorrow, three in the AAC and five in the National league, but the Cleveland-Yankees meeting gets top billing.

The other AAC games find the Los Angeles Dons at Baltimore and the Chicago Hornets at Buffalo.

In the National it's the New York Bulldogs at Philadelphia, Los Angeles Rams at Chicago Cardinals, Detroit at New York Giants, Chicago Bears at Washington and Pittsburgh's Steelers at Green Bay.

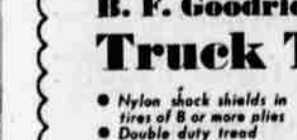
