Capital Parkway, Mall Proposed

PORTLAND, Nov. 19 (AP)—A mall and parkway, to be constructed on Summer street, would be a central feature of the state capital at Salem if a preliminary development plan is adopted.

State buildings would line the wall. They would be built in the area between Winter and Capitol streets, and north from Court street up to D street—with landscaping in between.

There is always misunderstanding concerning the two and a half days a month accrued leave normally given to veteran trainees. Technically GI students can take it but actually the only time it will be approved is when there is illness of either the student or his immediate family. This will be taken off his course and not added to it, as many believe. If this leave is not taken by the time the course is completed it cannot be allowed.

Fifteen days of optional leave may be taken either in July or on graduation if applied for two weeks in advance. This time is not taken from the course as in the case of accrued leave, however it is deducted from the student's entitlement.
