

Community Clean-Up For Health Planned; Many Workers Needed

"Klamath Falls is going to have its face scrubbed, and you're expected to provide the soap and the energy."

This was the opinion expressed by a group of citizens who gathered in the chamber of commerce offices Friday afternoon to organize the Community Clean-Up For Health Program.

Help!
A comparatively small group of people—compared to the number who will be asked to help in the extensive program—have outlined the project which includes cleaning up unsightly vacant lots, residential areas where folks have been careless, making the entrances into the city more attractive to the tourists, and checking health hazards.

Attending the session Friday were Mayor Robert A. Thompson, representing the city; Frank Jenkins, publisher of The Herald and News;

Charles Stark, manager of the chamber of commerce; Clay Bellisle, representing Exchange club; F. H. Thompson, Rotary; Art Reinhart, Klamath Merchants association; H. O. Juckeland, Klamath County Tuberculosis and Health association and Klamath Automobile Dealers association, and Dr. Buford Hargus, also representing the health association.

'Town in General'
Other individuals and organizations will be asked to come into the picture and the general plan will include schools, clubs, and the "town in general."

As much of the clean-up as can be done before winter actually sets in, is the hope of the committee which anticipates much benefit from the campaign.

The program is sponsored by the Klamath County Tuberculosis and Health association.

Heavy Dealing Boosts Grains

CHICAGO, Nov. 19 (AP)—All grains moved upward in heavy dealings on the board of trade today, paced by corn. The yellow cereal had gains extending to 2 cents at times. Deferred contracts scored new seasonal highs.

Strength of corn was tied in with export demand for this grain. It was reflected also in the spot market where No. 2 yellow corn sold at a discount of 2 to 2 1/2 cents compared with the December delivery. Yesterday the discount was 2 to 3 1/2 cents.

Other grains mostly followed the leadership of corn. Some inflationary sentiment appeared to be present in the pits. Dealings became quite active toward the close as the demand met selling orders from traders evening up for the week-end holiday.

Wheat closed 1/4 cent higher, December \$2.11 1/4, corn was 1 to 1 1/2 higher, December \$1.24 1/4, oats were 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, December 75 1/2-75, rye was 1/4-1/2 higher, December \$1.34 1/4-1.34, soybeans were 1 to 1 1/4 higher, November \$2.24 1/2, and lard was 5 to 7 cents a hundred pounds higher, December \$10.32.

Stock Market Slows Down

NEW YORK, Nov. 19 (AP)—The stock market ambled along a narrow price route today after a snappy three-day rise.

Most price changes were upward. Gains were small, though, and a wide variety of shares either remained at Friday's closing levels or backed down a little. Few stocks moved more than fractionally.

Business started off with a rush but quieted as soon as overnight orders were disposed of. Turnover ran at a rate of 600,000 shares for the two-hour session.

Railroad stocks did fairly well, with higher prices paid for Santa Fe, N.Y. Central, Southern Railway, and Union Pacific.

Mass Held For Rancher Con O'Keeffe

LAKEVIEW—Requiem high mass was held Tuesday for Con J. O'Keeffe, Adel rancher, killed instantly Armistice night when a half-track in which he was riding went over a bank in Hammersley canyon.

Mr. O'Keeffe, 57, was with his nephew, Henry O'Keeffe of Adel and George Bowers of Lakeview. They were moving some of the O'Keeffe sheep from that area. Henry O'Keeffe and Bowers, both injured in the accident, walked for about six miles before they reached help.

Irish Native
The victim was born June 29, 1892, at Newmarket, Ireland, and came to Lake county from Ireland in 1910 engaging in the livestock industry in Lake and Klamath counties. He was associated with his brother John until the latter's death May 30, 1943. He was a member of Lake county post No. 33, American Legion and was a veteran of World War I when he served in the St. Mihiel, Chateau Thierry and Meuse-Argonne offensives in France.

Other Survivors
In addition to relatives in Warner valley and Lakeview, Mr. O'Keeffe is survived by three brothers, Dan and Tom O'Keeffe of Merrill and Malin, Humphrey O'Keeffe of Sacramento, four brothers and two sisters in Ireland.

Mass was said by Father F. L. Geis with Father O'Connor of Merrill and Father Phalen of Chiloquin assisting, at St. Patrick's Catholic church. Graveside service was conducted by Lake County post, American Legion.

Lost Hunter Sought In Umatilla

PENDLETON, Nov. 19 (AP)—A Umatilla county sheriff joined other searchers this morning looking for Russell Hall, Weston hunter, believed lost in the Tolgate area of the Blue mountains, 35 miles east of Pendleton.

Hall, a member of an elk hunting party, failed to show up at the hunting camp Friday night.

Horse Drags, Kills Pine Valley Youth

BAKER, Nov. 19 (AP)—A 15-year-old Pine Valley youth was dragged to his death yesterday by a bolting horse, according to Coroner Thad Beatty.

The boy, Vernel Leon Sagers, Halfway, was killed early yesterday morning as he was herding cattle, the coroner reported. His death resulted from a fractured skull.

The coroner said the boy's horse fell, then jumped up and bolted away with young Sager's foot caught in the stirrup.

Portland Wins Slough Suit

PORTLAND, Nov. 19 (AP)—A jury decided yesterday that sewage dumped into Columbia slough was not responsible for damage to the logs of two shingle companies.

The firms—Portland Shingle company and East St. Louis Shingle company—had sued Portland for \$130,000, contending sewage damaged their cedar logs. A jury decided in favor of the city of Portland after five and a half hours' deliberation.

County Officials Favor U.S. Congress Pattern For State Legislature

PORTLAND, Nov. 19 (AP)—Oregon's county officials like the idea of giving each county one state senator, and a number of state representatives based on the county's population.

That plan, proposed by State Rep. Giles French of Moro, was endorsed by the association of Oregon counties at its convention yesterday.

It would follow the same pattern used in the U. S. congress. At present, both the state senate and the state house of representatives are apportioned on a population basis.

Power, President
The county judges and commissioners elected Judge T. A. Power of Jefferson county as president.

Judge D. N. Bussenbark of Douglas county was elected vice-president and Marion County Commissioner Roy J. Rice was reelected secretary-treasurer.

The convention suggested that charitable and religious organizations which operate business in competition with private enterprise be subject to taxation.

That was one of the sources of new revenue proposed to augment the scarce county income.

More License
Another was thorough licensing outdoor theatres and night clubs. The state would have to pass a law

authorizing the counties to license such establishments.

The county officials also recommended a constitutional amendment which would not include welfare budgets in the 6 per cent tax limitation.

Oregon's county treasurers, which met here at the same time, demonstrated their feminine loyalty by electing all women officers. Twenty of the 36 treasurers are women.

Mrs. E. T. Fairchild, Deschutes county, was elected president; Mrs. T. H. Mosgrove, Umatilla county, vice president; and Mrs. Alice Davidson, Josephine county, secretary-treasurer.

Woman Sought To Identify Body in N.Y.

New York city police are attempting to locate a Mildred Cox, believed to be in Klamath Falls, in an effort to identify a man whose body is unclaimed in the metropolis.

A man tentatively identified as Dominio Bakowski is dead in New York and his body unclaimed. According to information relayed here from New York, Bakowski is believed to be a former husband of Mrs. Cox.

August W. Flath, inspector of New York police, wants to know of any relatives who could identify and claim the body.
