What Don't You Like In Europe?

LONDON, Nov. 19 (AP)—American tourists don't think much of British plumbing or of the telephone service. What else don't they like?

A 30-day survey by questionnaire is underway to find out. It was set up by Col. J. T. Pozzy, chief of the travel department section for the economic cooperation administration. The questionnaire is given to American tourists leaving London on the boat trains after they have completed their tours of Britain.

Beefs Pozzy told the recent International Hotel association here he already had surveyed 1500 American tourists in Europe, with these findings: "The vast majority of American tourists today must travel on a modest budget. The day of the gay millionaire and the de luxe suite is pretty well done.

"We found that those who were 'first class' visitors had few criticisms to make. "But well over a third of those traveling cabin or tourist class had encountered unsatisfactory sanitary conditions and their comments frequently were scathing.

Phones "Another subject which brought forth anguished comments from

travelers was the telephone service. Nearly half rated the system poor." Pozzy said many complained, too, that hotels were more expensive than they had expected and that hotel beds were none too comfortable.

He urged hotel keepers to make all possible improvements. Tourists spending, he pointed out, is the biggest single source of dollar revenue for most of the nations in the European recovery plan.
