Mme. Laval Fights To Keep House

PARIS Nov. 21 (AP)—Mme. Pierre Laval, 60-year-old widow of the late Vichy premier, said today she will resist all attempts to requisition her house.

She said she was visited by 12 men Saturday, including a communist municipal councillor, who claimed they had an order to requisition the house for a family with six children.

"You have already committed an assassination by killing my husband," Mme. Laval said she told
