

# Business, Industry In Strong Recovery After Strikes End

**NEW YORK, Nov. 21 (AP)—**Free of crippling strikes for the first time in two months, business and industry made a strong recovery last week.

Almost all important indicators of activity pointed higher, with the rebound most pronounced in the steel mills and coal mines.

Retail trade recovered sharply in areas that had been hard hit by the lack of purchasing power of strikers and registered a modest increase over the preceding week in other areas.

Overall volume however, was still under that of a year ago when the national economy was bouncing along at an annual gross product rate of \$280,000,000, highest in history. (It is estimated to be currently running at a \$250-\$255 billion annual rate.)

**Stocks Climb**  
 The stock market shook off a two-week decline and went into a sustained advance that more than regained all the ground lost during the repeated retreats in the closing stages of the labor troubles. Investment rated issues made a good showing in the bond department and the few new money issues that were brought out for investor appraisal received an approving nod.

One of the most significant events of the week occurred late Thursday. A buying drive of size and force developed suddenly in the New York textile markets. It sent prices higher and carried forward bookings far into next year for some types of goods before it ended.

**"Booming"**  
 The idea of good business the balance of this year and well into the new one apparently gained new recruits this week. A big gathering of radio manufacturers in New York brought out reports of booming business not only in television sets but in radios as well.

President Truman told a New England council meeting he believed the country was over the worst part of the adjustment "that had to come after the inflationary boom we experienced last year," and Jack Straus, president of the big Macy department store chain, told his stockholders the nationwide downward trend in retail sales appears to be at an end.

**"Healthy, Stable"**  
 "While we do not believe that the postwar adjustments have been completed," he said, "we feel hopeful that the basis has been laid for the development of a more healthy and expanding economy which would permit more stable operating conditions."

Secretary of Commerce Sawyer added up the box score at the conclusion of a five-month "grass roots" tour that carried him 14,000 miles and found no reason why business should not resume its upswing once the kinks caused by the strikes are straightened out.

Last week's business chart bristled with convincing evidence that no time would be lost in shifting into high gear after the long period

Amos Crosby, 24, was wounded in the leg and John Garlington, 3rd, 21, suffered a hip wound.

Weeks was not arrested last night. Detective Macmurdo said he is still investigating the incident. Streetcar conductors are allowed to carry weapons for their protection.
