Auto Industry Crippled By Steel Strike

DETROIT, Nov. 23 (AP)—Delayed effects of the steel strike will hit the nation's automobile industry hard next week.

With but few exceptions the factories closing tonight for the Thanksgiving holiday will remain idle until perhaps December 12 or later.

Ford, Hudson and Studebaker and a few branch assembly plants of other companies around the country will furnish all the motor vehicle output next week. Even Ford will cut down to four days' operation and Studebaker has announced it will close on November 30.

Tumble
Thus weekly production will tumble sharply to probably not more than 50,000 vehicles. And the plant closings added to those already down will bring temporary idleness to an estimated quarter million automotive workers.

In several instances unemployment will be relieved by the continuance of parts fabricating work in many plants. A number of car makers about to swing over to new model production also have kept a substantial number of their employees at work on plant rearrangement, inventory, parts, service and sales operations.

Approximately two-thirds of the industry's productive capacity will be affected by the impending shut-downs.

Industry authorities say the steel strike will have cost close to half a million vehicles before its final effects have been felt in the automotive plants.

Half-Rate Tickets For Half Show

TOKYO, Nov. 23 (AP)—Japan's largest movie chain probably will start a new policy on the first of the year.

Gallup Poll Poll Voters Say Republicans Need New Leadership, Policy

PRINCETON, N. J.—As republican leaders cast about for a winning formula for 1950 and 1952, the public sees three main things wrong with the republican party. These are brought out in a survey in which a cross-section of the voters in all states spoke their minds to interviewers for the institute. They said:

1—It's the party of business; it's for the rich and does little for the poor. "They have passed no laws to help the working class" is a typical comment. Another voter called the GOP "the financial party."

2—The leadership is unsatisfactory; the party needs new blood, new candidates. "The same men have been too long in the driver's seat," said one voter. "There are no new men around," he added.

3—The republican platform is indefinite and wobbly; it lacks genuine liberalism; tries to copy the democratic part of the time and oppose them the rest of the time.

Results
Here is the way the survey came out:

- "The republican party has not won a presidential election since 1928. What do you yourself think is wrong with the republican party today?"
- Big business party, all for rich, nothing for poor 13%
- Poor leadership, need new blood, new candidates 20%
- Poor platform, indefinite, no liberalism, copy democrats 13%
- Lack of drive, don't work hard enough, poorly organized 8%
- Not united 4%
- Nothing wrong 5%
- Miscellaneous 13%
- Don't know 16%

(*The table totals more than 100 per cent because some voters named more than one factor.)
Independent voters in the survey put the criticism of "big business party" in top place and also feel that the party leadership is unsatisfactory. The independents hold the balance of power in national politics, and a republican victory in 1950 would be virtually impossible without strong support from the party from the independent group.

Republican View
Republican voters themselves put emphasis on lack of leadership, but consider that alleged ties with big business are not a problem of the first order.
They put platform and more energetic party organization ahead in importance.

Here are the criticisms voiced by the republican rank and file:

Omen of Recent Elections
The nationwide democratic sweep in last week's elections, which had been foreshadowed repeatedly in institute reports on party strength during the past year, started widespread speculation about the future of the republican party. Republicanism's greatest omen in the gubernatorial election in New Jersey, where the republican incumbent, Alfred E. Driscoll, won.

A program for the republicans was recently set forth by Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., of Massachusetts, who has become famous for his proposals to reform and improve the electoral system.

Senator Lodge sees a need for the republican party to stress governmental efficiency, civil rights, and a broad program of social legislation.

McKay Urges CARE Christmas Gifts

SALEM, Nov. 22 (AP)—Governor McKay urged that CARE packages be bought for Christmas gifts for needy persons in Europe.

He said CARE has 100,000 holiday food packages stored in warehouses in Europe. These packages may be bought by Americans, and they will be sent from the warehouses.
