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60 Bowl Games--or--More But None Have Footballish Flavor

ATLANTA, Nov. 24 (AP)—Judging from 60 bowls, some defunct but many still kicking, naming a football "classic" must be an awful ordeal.

You can imagine how long it must have taken to think up the "Spaghetti Bowl," the "Bacardi Bowl," the "Lily" or the "Beauty." No doubt there have been, and possibly are, far more than 60 football bowls. But 60 is all available after a tireless search.

As hard as many names must have been to come by, not one bowl thought to select something footballish—for instance, "the Pigskin Bowl" or the "the Mouse Trap Bowl."

Instead, names honor in this order: foodstuffs, horticulture, geography, natural resources, animals, history, legend, irritants, organizations and alcoholic beverages.

Also there are 12 names which defy classification. Just call them miscellaneous.

The various types of foodstuffs honored are: the Spaghetti Bowl (as mentioned above), the Peanut Bowl, Sugar, Junior Sugar, Orange, Tangerine, Pineapple, Peach, Salad, Raisin, Coconut and Chocolate.

Plant life, other than edibles, most honored are: the Burley, the Tobacco, Rose, Junior Rose, Texas Rose, Cotton, Flower, Orange Blossom, Azalea, Oleander and the Lilly Bowl.

Far from slighted is geography, commemorated by such great football games as the Great Lakes Bowl, the Delta, Dixie, Shrine East-West, Shrine North-South, Prairie View, Smoky Mountain, Harbor, Oriental and the Mid-State.

Natural resources made further famous by football are: the Oil Bowl, the Coal, the Sweetheart Bowl (classified by some as a natural resource), and the Beauty (ditto).

Three animals have bowl names: the Gator, Lions and Cattle. History isn't slighted by the Alamo Bowl and the Blue-Gray all-star game.

Legend is revived by the Vulcan and the Santa Claus.

The Shrine Bowl (not to be confused with the Shrine Cigar, the Shrine North-South or the Shrine East-West) is named for Shrine-dom. The Dust Bowl is classed as an irritation because of the name, not for the type football played.

Havana's one-shot Bacardi Bowl is alcoholic beverage only for certain representatives.

Big Ten Sets New Fan Mark

CHICAGO, Nov. 24 (AP)—Big Ten football attendance records were completely shattered in 1949, with the enlarged stadium at three schools and the top-spy championship race both contributing to the breakage.

Conference teams played before 2,920,222 fans in 1949 in 53 games with big ten and non-league opponents—an average of 55,099. In big ten games only the gridiron warriors drew 1,880,685 for 28 games for a 60,024 average.

The past season's attendance blasted all previous marks, including the record 2,751,661 spectators for 54 games in 1947 and the 1,542,827 for 29 conference games in 1946. In 1948 the gate was 2,750,162 for 53 games (all games).

Michigan, Northwestern and Purdue, each with enlarged seating capacities, set new records for single games. Michigan's plant which seats 97,239 was filled to capacity four times during the season. The Wolverines set at new big ten home record by playing to 563,363 persons in six games. They also set a record for all games, attracting 772,482 for nine games at home and away.

Big nine teams played 25 non-league opponents this fall, winning 14, losing nine and tying two.

L.A. Don's Chances Squeaky

NEW YORK, Nov. 24 (AP)—The Los Angeles Dons and Chicago Hornets, two weak sisters in the All-America football conference, face their last chance to gain a playoff berth today—but they are mighty slim indeed.

All the Hornets must do is to defeat the mighty Cleveland Browns, who've dropped only one game in nine starts. The Dons' task is not much easier. They must whip the third place New York Yankees, who already hold a 22-10 decision over them.

It would take a Baltimore triumph over Buffalo Sunday to vault either the Hornets or Dons into fourth place. Each eleven has one or more regular season games to play. The first four teams meet in a post-season playoff to decide the pennant.

In the only National league game today, the Chicago Bears tangle with the Detroit Lions in an all-western division scrap. The second place Bears still have a mathematical chance to overhaul the first place Los Angeles Rams. Fresh from their 45-21 victory over the New York Giants, the Lions need a victory to break their last place deadlock with Green Bay. The Bears eked out a 27-24 victory in the first encounter between the two elevens.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 24 (AP)—Can Eddie Waitkus make a comeback in baseball in 1950?

President Bob Carpenter of the Philadelphia Phillies believes the brilliant first sacker can. As a result, Carpenter is going all out to see to it that Waitkus will be in top shape when the 1950 season gets under way.

Waitkus, shot by a Chicago bobby soxer last spring, now is in Clearwater, Fla., taking light workouts, swimming and walking.

But, Carpenter isn't going to take any chances on Waitkus doing anything that may hurt him.

So, next Monday Trainer Frank Weiche, a therapeutic expert, will leave for Clearwater with instructions to supervise all of Waitkus' activities and see to it that he takes the proper exercise.

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Dick Dunkel's College Football Power Index

EXPLANATION—The Power Index provides a direct comparison of the relative strength of any two teams for this season in date. Thus, a 30.9 team has been 10 scoring points stronger than a 10.0 team on their comparative records, in which scoring margin has been weighed against strength of opposition. This does not necessarily mean that a 30.9 team should defeat a 10.0 team by exactly 10 points in the future. Teams rarely follow past performance that closely. The Dunkel system correlates records of all college teams and was started in 1939.
