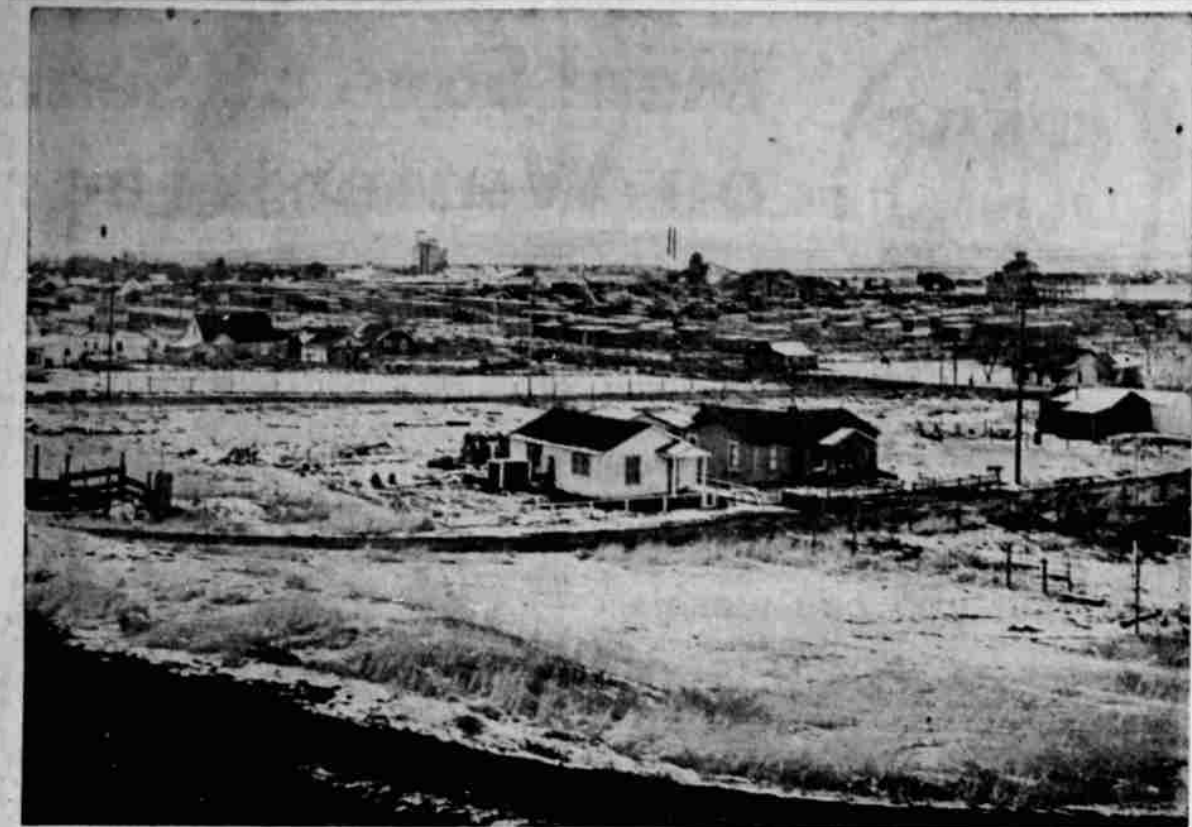

Along Nature's Trail

Conservationists note that all over the United States there is a developing community interest in the problems concerned with natural resources. Take the forest as an example. The term "sustained yield" is a subject that is beginning to have a definite meaning to many communities in the forest areas; especially to those communities who are fast approaching the limit of their stand of virgin timber. This was not true in the past when forest communities flourished under the stimulus of exploitation of virgin timber reserves and when the forest was cut over the community usually became a ghost town or moved bodily to some other new area, fresh for exploitation.

The history of the lumber industry in the United States has been a nomadic one, continuously shifting its center of production from region to region as the timber was "cut out." "Cut and Get Out" was a commonplace phrase and attitude of the early days of the industry.

From the time of our Pilgrim fathers down to around 1860 the bulk of lumber came from the northeastern states and the Allegheny mountains. It took us two hundred years to exhaust the forests and the industry had to shift its center to the Great Lakes states. It is said that this new virgin country had greater and finer stands of timber than the northeastern states but the tempo of exploitation had speeded up so it required only thirty years to wade through the vast stands of white and Norway pine.

The old order of "cut and get out" prevailed and so the shift was to the southern pine region of the Atlantic seaboard; the Carolinas and the Blue Ridge mountains. This area held the spotlight but a few years before the shift was made to the pine region of the Gulf states and this area finally bowed to the west coast the last stand of virgin timber. The industry has a history one can interpret as a glorious achievement or a depressing record of widespread waste and desolation sprinkled liberally with boom and bust communities, the example of more than two and a half centuries of exploitation.

About the turn of the century a new idea came into the picture, "the forests are ours to use and enjoy but not ours to destroy," and

out of this idea came the conservation movement of today. A few and far seeing individuals prevailed upon President Cleveland to take a step to protect the future of the nation's forests and this resulted in the National Forests at that time called "Forest Reserves." These reserves composed most of the timber areas of the public lands of the United States.

The Forest Reserves were set aside from other public lands, largely by proclamation of President Cleveland, McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt. This was an unprecedented move on the part of the executive branch of government and it created much furor at the time as well as consternation in the ranks of those who desired to exploit all of the timber resources of the nation.
