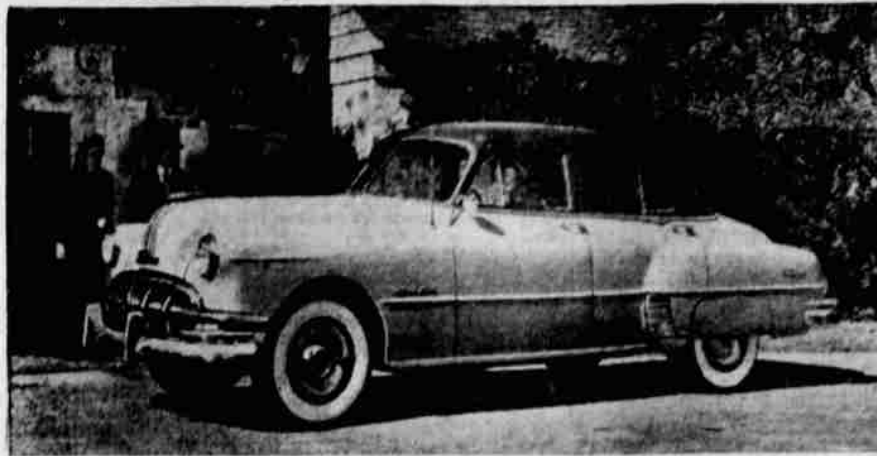

## Klan Robe, Sharp Issue In Trial

ROME, Ga., Nov. 24 (AP) — A sharp issue at the U. S. district court trial of 12 men on civil rights charges is whether a rumpled, white Ku Klux Klan robe should be admitted as evidence.

U. S. Attorney J. Ellis Mundy tried to put it in yesterday but Defense Lawyer Frank Gleason raised objections. They were still arguing when Judge Frank Hooper recessed court until Monday.

Gleason said the government had not proved that any of the defendants are Klansmen. Mundy asserted that if it had not it would.

**Proof**  
It will prove, said the U. S. attorney, that the beating of seven Negroes out of which the trial charges arose, a Klan parade and two cross burnings—all near Hooker, Ga., the night of April 2 — are related events.

In the trial Sheriff John W. Lynch of Dade county, three of his deputies, and eight private citizens are charged with conspiring to deprive the Negroes of their civil rights.
