Study Of Youth Authority Planned

The organizational meeting of the Social Welfare committee of The League of Women Voters, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Willard Duncan met Wednesday at the Klamath County Health Center.

Mrs. Duncan called the meeting to plan a program of study and action for the year's work. The group were unanimous in deciding to study the proposed State Youth Authority movement. The plan originated in the 1930's when a Delinquency committee of the Community Service society in New York City was shocked by its findings and published a report which enlisted the interest of the American Law Institute. Through the work of leaders in criminology, psychiatrists and sociologists a model "Youth Correction Authority Act" was made public ten years later. California, Minnesota, and Wisconsin enacted legislation on this matter, and in 1948 Massachusetts followed suit.

A Youth Authority is a program set up by legislative action to handle youthful offenders and their parents which enlists the interest of the state, the young lawbreakers to be handled by specialist like patients in a hospital, diagnosed, treated, and released when cured or reformed but not before.

Mrs. Duncan is anxious for anyone interested in youth welfare to align themselves with her committee in the winter's study on the problem.

The proposed Youth Authority for Oregon has been discussed twice in legislature and Governor McKay appointed an interim committee to study it further with the hope that there will be a vote taken in the 1951 legislature.

The League of Women Voters, always active in Child Welfare work, is studying this subject statewide.

The next meeting will be the first week in December and announcement of date and place will be made.
