## Northwest All-Stars Named

**PORTLAND, Nov. 28 (AP)—** Three backs and a lineman were unanimous choices of northwest conference football coaches Saturday for conference all-star honors.

The selections were made in conjunction with the league's business session where tentative agreement was reached to send the conference title winner to the Pear Bowl at Medford, Ore., each year.

Pacific university, one of this year's three co-champions, defeated the California Aggies in the Thanksgiving Day event this year 33-15.

Getting the all-star nod without objection were Tom Wimbler, college of Idaho halfback and league-leading scorer; Stan Russell, Pacific back and runnerup in league tallying; Reuben Balch, Lewis & Clark fullback; and John Jubo, Pacific center.

Wimbler, Russell and Tackle Bob Magette of Pacific were repeaters from the 1948 all-conference selections.

Other of the coaches' picks included: Ends Drew Miller of Whitman and Art Bakke of Lewis & Clark, Tackle Willard Stephens of Lewis & Clark; Guards Joe Caldwell, College of Idaho, and Leroy Gamble, Pacific; and John Baxter, Whitman back.

The tentative Pear Bowl agreement calls for the league champion to meet the Far West conference titlist. Proceeds would go to the Shrine.

## No Soft Touch for Snapp in Comeback

Ursal "Ginger" Snapp makes a comeback Friday night in the armory ring where he has tasted defeat only once—but boxing experts feel that the Snapper is biting off too big a hunk in his first return to the ring in many months.

The "too big a hunk" is Frankie Gimbel, knock-out artist from Spokane, Washington.

One thing is certain. Boxing fans will see a fight that would swell the rafters in any boxing club on the coast.

It's a rematch between the pair. Gimbel, hard-hitting midweight, stopped Snapp in five rounds in Tacoma, Wash., last summer in a match that was described by Northwest sportswriters as a "Pier 6 longshore brawl."

**BOTH DROPPED**

Both fighters kissed the canvas. Snapp dropped Gimbel in the first round. But the veteran of 70 ring battles came back to deck Ginger three times and stop him in the fifth when Snapp suffered a cut eye.

Gimbel will no doubt be favored but Snapp has other ideas. The match was wrested from Tacoma promoters by Mack Lillard because Snapp wanted to make his initial fight in his comeback before Klamath basin fans. Only once have local backers of Snapp seen the Merrill Mauler beaten in these parts. That defeat was registered by Emory Jackson.

**GOOD RECORD**

Gimbel has an impressive record. He has fought in the neighborhood of 70 professional battles with a record of better than 85 per cent on the win side.

He is an aggressive crowd pleaser who will take a punch to land one. But many feel that he won't take many of Snapp's thunderous blows and stay in a vertical position.

Gimbel boxed 14 consecutive main events in Spokane in 1947-48 and won 13 by knockouts. His 1949 record, in 11 fights, is 8 wins (6 by the kayo route), two draws and one loss.

But Snapp also boasts a long string of knockouts and there are few who expect the bout to go a ten-round limit.

**BRUCE WILL SHOW**

Johnny Bruce, sensational Medford welterweight, who won the Southern Oregon amateur lightweight and welter titles before turning to the pro ranks, will meet Puppy Jackson, local club fighter, in the six-round semi-windup.

An opponent is being sought to face George Price of Merrill in a four-round special bout. Two other preliminary bouts will round out the card.

## C OF P SCORES 500

**NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (AP)** Eighteen college football teams sported unbeaten, untied records today and only one of them—mighty Notre Dame—had a game left to complete the regular season.

The Irish wind up their campaign next Saturday against Southern Methodist. They'll be shooting for their 10th triumph of the year and their 38th straight game without defeat.

The Thanksgiving week-end brought nary a casualty among the teams boasting perfect records. Seven of them played and stretched their streaks, all except Notre Dame closing out their regular campaigns.

Notre Dame snowed under California, 32-0; Oklahoma routed Oklahoma A. and M., 41-0; Army sank Navy, 38-0; College of Pacific ran over California Poly, 88-0; Gannon (Pa.) downed Steubenville, 19-0; Maryland State rolled past the Fayetteville (N.C.) Teachers, 60-0; and Morgan State beat Virginia State, 34-7.

By far the biggest scorer of the unbeaten, untied squads was College of the Pacific, which finished with a total of exactly 500 points for 10 games while permitting its opponents 66. Oklahoma's Sooners were second highest with 364, also for 10 games.

St. Vincent (Pa.) came closest to a perfect defense, giving up six points to its foes in nine games while scoring 220.

Wofford won the most games, 11. The list includes Oregon College of Education with 304 points against 41 in winning nine games.

## Grant Powerhouses To 33-0 Victory Over Hillsboro

**PORTLAND, Nov. 28 (AP)—**The Generak from Grant high of Portland powerhoused their way to the Oregon high school football finals by defeating Hillsboro, 33 to 0, here Saturday.

The wallowing gave the Generals a favored status for their fourth state title when they come up against La Grande here in Multnomah civic stadium this Saturday.

La Grande squeezed past Marshfield in Coos Bay, 7 to 6, Friday night in the other semi-final.

The Hillsboro Spartans fought valiantly for the first half. They held Grant to a single touchdown. But then the Generals opened up their heavy artillery and took advantage of three breaks to sweep to the win.

Two pass interceptions produced touchdowns. Another came after recovering a Hillsboro fumble.

Halfback Dale Duff opened the scoring late in the first quarter when he took a pitchout from Quarterback George Shaw and raced 47 wet, sloppy yards for the score. Hillsboro tightened its defense and held until the third quarter. But in that period Duff capped a three-play ground assault with a 35-yard run for another score.

Trying to recover the initiative, Hillsboro tried to pass. One by Danny French was intercepted by Grant's Rube Menashe, who kept going for 77 yards to score. Another interception set up the next score.

Al Hansen caught this one on the Hillsboro 38 and went to the 26. Three plays later Duane Siebert went over from the two.

In the final quarter, Grant's reserves took over and scored after recovering a fumble on their own 10. On the next play, Sub Dean Jaspers broke through the Hillsboro line—and kept going.

Grant moved 514 yards, compared with Hillsboro's 297 yards.
