Salem Pilot Puts Plane in Columbia

CASCADE LOCKS, Ore., Nov. 28 (AP)—A Salem pilot and his woman companion waded and swam ashore here yesterday after their plane came down in the Columbia river. Neither was hurt in the mishap.

Pilot Cecil L. Dill put the plane down in a power landing about 50 feet from shore. The woman occupant, Wilma Crawford, Salem, said Dill threw open the door just before the plane struck.

"Luckily," she said, "I touched bottom several times on the way to shore, as I can't swim."

They were en route home from Walla Walla after taking Leland Spriggs, Salem, to a veterans hospital in Washington. Cause of the accident was not determined. The plane owner, Clement Fisher, Salem, reported Dill set the plane down in a "skillful power-stall landing." He said the plane came down in about 7 feet of water. He thought it could be salvaged.

He said more people should do it—and when they get to places, they should talk to everybody, not just editors and officials. (Or professional pollsters, I presume.)

The average American is a discerning individual with an open mind, the President said. And he'll listen to you if you have something to say. (How true. In fact, how Truman!)

Western Nations Plan Defenses Against Any Aggression by Russia

PARIS, Nov. 28 (AP)—The West's top military men today start work on plans to use nearly a billion American dollars for Atlantic defense against any Russian aggression.

Chiefs of staff of the United States, Britain and France—the major signers of the North Atlantic pact—will meet for two days in the French naval ministry building.

Unified Plan
They are to draw a unified plan to defend Western Europe. Not until the integrated plan is finished can the U. S. supply nearly one billion dollars in money and arms that congress voted to help strengthen the 11 other nations that signed the treaty.

On Thursday the defense ministers of the 12 countries meet with the three military chiefs. Political questions will be taken up then, along with the technical details of the military plan.

But U. S. Chief of Staff Gen. Omar Bradley and Defense Secretary Louis Johnson already have disposed of one burning politico-de-
