SEATTLE, Nov. 28 (AP)—After nearly a year of "tramping" around the world, the Chinese Nationalist freighter Shanghai Victory is headed for her new home port at Hong Kong.

The American-built vessel, owned and operated by China Union Lines, limited, sailed Friday with a full cargo of nitrate fertilizer loaded in British Columbia. She was the first Chinese owned ship to enter the Seattle harbor since before the war.
