School's Mass Illness Cause Undetermined

The definite cause of a Thanksgiving outbreak of food poisoning at Altamont elementary school cannot be determined, County Sanitarian John Edge reported today.

No samples of food served to Altamont students in the school cafeteria last Wednesday were available for testing.

Some 70 youngsters became ill after eating the Thanksgiving meal.

Edge said three items on the menu were considered questionable but there was evidence pro and con on all three. The turkey dressing first was blamed for the poisoning but there is no conclusive proof that it was responsible or that any particular item on the menu was responsible.

Edge said the county health department turned up no evidence of negligence or carelessness in preparation or handling of the food and that the cafeteria is operated in a sanitary manner.

WHEAT AND OATS ADVANCE

CHICAGO, Nov. 29 (AP)—Wheat and oats advanced at the board of trade today, but corn lagged. The advance in wheat was attributed to mill buying in December delivery, accompanied by short covering.

Oats acted tight from the start of the session and offerings were small.

At the finish wheat was 1/4 to 2 cents higher than yesterday's close, December \$2.18-2.19. Corn was 1/4 to 1/2 cent higher, December \$1.30-1.31. Oats were 1/4 to 1/2 cent higher, December 78-79. Rye was unchanged to 1/4 lower, December \$1.27-1.28. Soybeans were unchanged to 1/4 lower, December \$2.28-2.29 and lard was 20 to 25 cents a hundredweight lower, December \$10.10.

MONROE, La., Nov. 29 (AP)—A pretty brunette carnival worker whose "murder" was described by an Arkansas convict, is alive in Texas, police here reported today.

Police Sgt. L. C. Taylor said authorities at Port Arthur, Tex., had told him that grey-eyed Ellen Cruse of Olla, La., was working at a ring-tossing concession operated there by an amusement company.

At Little Rock, Ark., Sgt. J. H. Porterfield of the Arkansas state police had quoted William Wayne (Billy) Kidd, 21-year-old transient, as saying he killed the girl and threw her body into a bayou near Bayou La Latta, last month, a few weeks after they were married.
