Annual KUHS Yule Concert Being Readied

Klamath TB Group Lauded By Kerron

Emphasizing that tuberculosis is a "serious problem among young adults," Dr. Seth Kerron, county health officer, in a statement today lauded the efforts of the Klamath County TB and Health association to bring the disease under control in the county and urged residents to support the 1949 Christmas Seal Sale to raise funds for the association's 1950 program. "Tuberculosis today causes more deaths among young adults between the ages of 15 and 34 than any other disease," Dr. Kerron pointed out, "although the disease can and does strike at any age." **Protection** "The local TB association's progressive and constructive program aims at the protection of all age groups within this county against this communicable disease. I heartily endorse the association's announced plan to increase and expand its projects during 1950 for TB prevention and control." Dr. Kerron added that since seal sale proceeds constitute the only financial support of the association, and the only appeal for funds, and since 75 per cent of the funds collected remains in Klamath county, every county resident should buy and use as many seals as possible.

Cheaper Fertilizer Need Stressed
PORTLAND, Nov. 29 (AP)—Cheaper fertilizers were listed as a major farming need by a scientist who spoke here yesterday to co-op delegates from Pacific Northwest states. Dr. George D. Scarseth, Lafayette, Ind., director of research for the American Farm Research association, said lower priced fertilizers would encourage farmers to replace minerals in the soil. He said farming by what he called "soil mining practices" has stripped nitrogen, phosphorus and potash from midwest soils in feeds and forages faster than the minerals were being replaced. He said this was occurring in an area of "the heaviest fertilizer users in the nation." Similar declines are ahead for western soils, he said, because of more intensive cropping.
