



### Lake Pioneer's Final Rites Thursday

SILVER LAKE — Final rites for Mrs. Mary Long, pioneer of Lake country who died at Bend on November 28 at the age of 87 years, will be held Thursday at 2 p. m. from the Silver Lake church with burial in the family plot at Silver Lake cemetery.

Mrs. Long was a beloved resident of Lake county for many years. She was born October 1, 1862, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Wyland who crossed the plains from Missouri and settled in Molalla where Mary was born. Later the family moved to Talent in Jackson county.

Mary Wyland and Alonzo Long were married in the valley and moved to Lakeside where Long had cattle holdings. In 1909 they ranched at Christmas Lake where they spent many years. Since the death of her husband, Mrs. Long has made her home with a son, Reuben Long of Fort Rock, Lake county.

Mrs. Long was the mother of the late E. R. "Pat" Long, Klamath county rancher. Survivors include a daughter, Anna Linebaugh of Silver Lake, and 2 grandsons, Murel Long of Klamath Falls, Jimmy Linebaugh of Silver Lake and one great-grandson, Lynn Long of Klamath Falls.

### Merrill Plans New School To Replace Burned Building

MERRILL — Students of the burned-out Merrill elementary school probably will start back to classes tomorrow and the wheels were put in motion last night to build a new 10-room grade school at Merrill.

About 250 students got a brief vacation from their book when the 38-year-old school building burned yesterday.

Most of them — the lower five grades — will attend classes in the Merrill recreation building for the remainder of this school year and the sixth grades will be taken into the high school building.

**Architecture**  
 The new school building to be completed by next September. Its architecture will be along the lines of the new Fred Peterson and Henley structures.

While the fire was going on, the Merrill park board okayed use of the recreation hall, which can be converted into classrooms with little cost. Two stoves are being put in the building to augment the present oil heat and furnishings are being brought from Peterson school and from Klamath Falls schools. Books are being borrowed around the county system.

The county school board held an emergency meeting last night to talk over the Merrill problem and voted to hire architect Howard Perrin to draw up plans for a 10-room and cafeteria building immediately. Construction cost probably will run around \$180,000.

The old Merrill school was due for replacement in 1951 but the fire moved the school board's building timetable up. The board expects to realize about \$35,000 from its insurance on the burned-out building and has enough money on hand to finance the construction without borrowing.

The blaze started about 7:30 yesterday morning, apparently in a fan motor in the furnace room. In about two hours only the brick skeleton was standing. As a safety measure, the brick walls were pulled down.

The school gymnasium was saved and will be used in connection with the new building.

Very little was saved from the flames in the school proper, and nothing from the upper story. Most student records burned.

**Losses**  
 Since the recreation hall is frequently in use by various organizations, some shifting of schedules may be necessary, but present plans are to continue to hold Boy Scout, Camp Fire Girls and Bluebird meetings in the hall and to go ahead with a scheduled Camp Fire father-daughter dinner on December 9.

DUNSMUIR — Funeral services for Leon A. Lucero, 71, a longtime resident of Yreka county, were held Monday in St. Joseph's Catholic church, Yreka. Interment was in St. Joseph's cemetery there. Gardner's chapel was in charge of arrangements.

Lucero, familiarly known as "Lee," died Saturday in the Siskiyou County General hospital, Yreka, where he had been confined for two months. He had been in ill health over two years and had made his home in Dunsmuir with his son Harold and family.

He was born in Woodland, Calif., February 20, 1879.

For many years he operated a barber shop in McCloud and also worked at that trade in Mount Shasta, when it was known as Sisson.
