GRAINS GAIN, THEN LOSE

CHICAGO, Dec. 1 (AP)—Grains had difficulty in holding on to minor advances on the board of trade today. Toward the close prices slipped, giving up about all the ground gained earlier.

At one time December wheat set a new seasonal high. Buying in large part represented hedge lifting against sales of cash grain to the federal crop insurance corporation. May and July wheat equalled seasonal highs but could not push through to new tops.

Reports from the Southwest saying farmers had increased sales of cash wheat preceded the turn-about in the market's trend. The report said: "Line elevators are agreed any further price advances would be marked by still more intensive liquidation by growers."

Wheat closed 1/4 lower to 3/4 higher, December \$2.18 1/2, corn was 1/4 lower to 1/4 higher, December \$1.28 1/2, oats were unchanged to 1/4 lower, December 77 1/2, rye was 2 1/4-2 1/2 higher, December \$1.37 1/2-1/4, soybeans were 1 1/2-2 1/4 higher, December \$2.31-2.30 1/2, and lard was 3 cents lower to 3 cents a hundred pounds higher, December \$10.10.
