

Dairy Herd Testers Hold Conference

Dairy herd improvement supervisors, representing testing organizations in 22 counties, were expected to attend the annual conference in Corvallis, yesterday.

J. D. Vertrees and C. T. Waldo represent Klamath county as testers for the local dairy herd improvement association.

H. P. Ewalt, Oregon State college extension dairy specialist, was in charge of the one-day meeting. Purpose of the annual get-together was to bring those in charge of testing up to date on latest developments and to provide information and ideas for improving the program. At present, Ewalt states, there are improvement groups in 22 counties employing 30 supervisors.

Virginia Brown To Attend Navy School

Virginia E. Brown, 5090 Harlan drive, has recently been sworn into the regular navy and will attend the Wave recruit training school at Great Lakes, Ill., as a seaman recruit.

Two other recruits, Miss Beverly McDaniel, Redmond and Miss Mildred V. Kizner, Wenatchee, Wash., were sworn in with Miss Brown.

Further training in specialist schools and duty at naval activities will follow their initial training period.

Specialties
Specialty schools include radio, aviation, hospital corps, dental technician, yeoman, radio-electronics, store-keeper and personnel work.

Enlistments are for a period of four or six years at the option of the enlistee. Assignments include overseas duty but are based on needs of the service.

Initial processing of applicants is handled by the U.S. Navy recruiting service located in the post office building.

Jews Leave Syria For Security

DAMASCUS (AP)—The small Jewish population remaining in ancient Damascus is shrinking steadily because Jewish families are leaving Syria in a search for greater security. One Arabic newspaper, "Al

Ayyam," estimates that about one hundred Jewish families left the city in the last three months. "Al Ayyam" said they went to Israel, smuggling their movable property and money with them. Informed sources say it is possible that some of the Jews reached Israel, but they believe most of them sought refuge in Beirut, across the mountains in Lebanon, traditionally a Christian area in a Moslem world.

Jewish sources decline to discuss the situation of the Jews in Damascus or Syria for fear of disturbing the present delicate status. However, it was learned that more than 5000 Jews have fled Damascus and

Aleppo in northern Syria since the Palestine struggle approached a climax in 1947. The 5000 figure is a conservative estimate. Reliable estimates place the present Jewish population of Damascus at 4000; of Aleppo at 2000. Syrian Jews have been concentrated in these two cities for centuries.

Spud Growers To Meet At Merrill

Klamath potato growers association has scheduled a meeting for 8 p. m., Wednesday December 1 at Merrill.

The program will include a progress report on potato handling experiments which have been carried in Idaho. The Idaho potato commission in cooperation with the Aberdeen experiment station has done considerable work on harvesting and handling methods and equipment.

Bill Humphrey, who heads the project, will explain the work and show motion pictures.

Humphrey is to attend a similar meeting of the Central Oregon potato association in Redmond December 5.

A report of proceedings at the national potato council meeting in Washington November 28 and 29 will be given by Louis Lyon.

Ben Davidson, administrator for the Oregon potato commission and members of the commission will be present to report on activities of the commission.

Tree Chemical To Reduce Fire Hazards
A new chemical compound which keeps Christmas trees green, reduces their needle loss, and makes them effectively fire resistant is now on the market.

The chemical is packed in a hermetically sealed can and is sold in its crystalline form. The user simply adds a can and a half of water, stands the tree trunk in the solution for four days or more and decorates it.

If the tree is then removed from the solution, it is quite safe for several weeks. However, if convenient, the trunk may be left standing in the solution.

This internal absorption, which is the method recommended by the national safety council, has the added advantage since the solution is harmless and non-toxic.

Flaxseed Production Decreases

World flaxseed production this year is estimated at 1333 million bushels. This is only 10 per cent below last year's crop, equals the 1935-1939 average, despite the sharp drop in North American output.

Canada's drastic cut in acreage resulted in the greatest change in production prospect of the 1949-50 flaxseed season. Acreage in the United States is down slightly, and yield per acre is the lowest in several years. This resulted in an output of less than 80 per cent of the 1948 record harvest but one-third above the 1938-1947 average.

Mexico's flaxseed crop, particularly on the West coast, is smaller than anticipated. Stocks of flaxseed and linseed—in terms of seed—in the important producing countries probably were well in excess of 100 million bushels on July 1, 1949.

At least 90 per cent of these stocks were in the western hemisphere. Flaxseed production has increased moderately in other parts of the world except in Africa, where the current estimate is more than double that of 1948.

Why Red Cars Speed Traffic

NEW YORK (AP)—Do you dislike having other motorists jockey past you while trying to drive at a safe and steady pace?

If so, don't buy a red car, advises Howard Ketcham, color and design engineer. A test of motorists' reactions showed that drivers are more impatient when trailing a red car because red is the most stimulating color—hence the greater urge to pass. Cream and yellow colors are also stimulating, while black, blues and greens without yellow undertones are the colors less inciting to the driver in the following car, Mr. Ketcham reports.
