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Judge Scolds Woman Jurors For Murder Acquittal; Tears

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 2 (AP)—An all-woman jury last night acquitted a Philadelphia man of a murder charge then burst into tears as the judge criticized them for what he called "a miscarriage of justice."

One of the women fainting under Judge Joseph Sloane's tongue lashing and was carried from the jury box.

The acquitted man was a 31-year-old bartender, James Comber, who was accused of kicking and beating to death prominent clubman Hubert E. Madden last March after a night-long drinking bout. Witnesses testified they saw Comber kick him.

Stiff Charge

In his charge to the jury, the judge said that "personally, I do not see how you can find a verdict of not guilty."

Defense Attorney John P. Walsh had emphasized that Comber was drunk the night of the clubman's death. Judge Sloane told the jury-women drunkenness could not be an excuse.

After hearing their verdict, the judge said to the jurors: "I tremble at what you did—at this miscarriage of justice. This case is important in itself, but more than that, one of the great bulwarks of our country is the jury system. Every little blot on that system... will gather into a great darkness."

Tearful Pool

The state had demanded a verdict of second degree murder, with a penalty of ten to twenty years in prison. In an individual poll, each

weeping jurorwoman answered for acquittal to the charges of murder and manslaughter laid against Comber.

Such a commotion followed the verdict that bailiffs had to threaten to clear the court.

Exchange Club Hears Mrs. Ferguson

A recent European visitor, Mrs. Twyla Ferguson spoke to the Exchange club yesterday, giving her opinion of political and economic transitions taking place in European countries as a result of aid from America.

She quoted one European politician on the aid program, that "as the economy of Europe increases, the danger from communism diminishes."

Dairy Products May Be Cheaper

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (AP)—Prices of dairy products will be somewhat lower next year unless the government's price supporting purchases are increased materially over 1949 levels, the agriculture department said today.

As for the rest of December, the department's monthly dairy situation report said little change would occur in these prices. Total milk flow, it said, is running larger than a year ago, and sizable purchases of manufactured products are still being made for price support.
