## World Today

THE Allied policy of keeping Germany disarmed indefinitely already seems to be heading into complications.

This column the other day called attention to the reiteration in Europe by U. S. Defense Secretary Johnson and U. S. Chief of Staff Bradley that America has no intention of rearming the reich. I commented that this created a strange situation, since Germany is being made an integral part of the Western European set-up and must be protected, and added:

"Should another war develop between West and East Europe (which heaven forbid) Western Germany presumably would be in the front-line defenses of the West. What happens then to the maintenance of German military impotence? It seems a fair guess that the reich would become not only a vital base for operations of the Western Allies, but might be invited to call German manpower to the colors for defense."

SINCE that writing, the Sozialdemokrat, official newspaper of the socialist democratic party in Western Berlin, has charged that the communists are creating a peoples army of 360,000 men in the Russian zone to impose their politics even after the Russian military forces withdraw. Such an army would mean one armed Red for every 50 persons in the Soviet zone—an ominous sounding figure.

The Russian newspaper Tsogliche Rundschau made the counter-charge that the Americans and British are creating a 180,000 man police force in their zones, and that the French are recruiting 7000 German police weekly. The Western Allies report that the total police force for all three zones is 113,000, which is one policeman for each 416 persons.

WELL, there we have a situation which gives pause for consideration. It is a position in which there could be a conflict between political and military thought. Not to put too fine a point on it, there are differences of opinion in some important quarters as to whether Germany should be rearmed in the interests of general peace.

The political viewpoint broadly speaking has been that German disarmament is essential to the maintenance of peace. This thesis has been strongly supported by the French who have suffered so grievously from invasion in the two World Wars. The political view has been that the reich wasn't to be trusted again.

The expressed military viewpoint in any country naturally follows the policy of the government. However, there is a large school of military experts among the Western Allies who maintain that from the practical standpoint Germany should be rearmed defensively. Such rearmament would be safeguarded by the maintenance of Allied military forces, and the Germans wouldn't be allowed again to create a military potential capable of aggression.

The arguments for rearming Germany rest mainly on two points: (1) The Germans admitted are among the world's best fighting men. (2) If there is another general European war Germany is likely to be the cockpit.

IF the Cold War between the Russian bloc and Western Europe could be ended, the German picture would change. There no longer would be need of rearming the country.

But until this unhappy strife between East and West is called off, the rearmament of Germany will remain a moot question.

## On Christmas Seals

LET'S congratulate the Christmas Seal sale committee of the Klamath County Tuberculosis and Health Association—not because of the good work selling the cheery little stamps, proceeds from which strike a continuing blow at tuberculosis, but because of one little insignificant thing in the letter mailed out with the seals.

The letter tells that 839 Oregonians were found to have tuberculosis last year. It tells that 75 cents out of each dollar contributed stays in Klamath county to provide Klamath people with free chest X-rays, with a health education program, with rehabilitation aid to those recovering from TB, and with continuous medical research. It tells that the seals are a dollar a sheet, and asks that this contribution be included in each Christmas shopping list.

An enclosure also tells some interesting things to know about TB: Tuberculosis is caused by a germ. TB is "catching." You cannot inherit TB from your parents. You can have TB without feeling sick. The doctor can tell whether or not you have TB by means of X-rays and other tests. TB can usually be cured if found early enough and treated properly. The tuberculosis hospital is the best place to go for treatment and to protect others from your germs.

## Modoc's Seven Mile Timber Cut Heavy

The Modoc Lumber company of Klamath Falls, high bidder for the U. S. department of forest service timber sale last spring in the area of Seven-Mile creek, has cut approximately 12 million board feet this year, according to R. L. Cooper, chief ranger.

The company halted cutting operations yesterday and is moving for the winter.

Cutting operations will be resumed next spring.

## Doctor Says Safeguard Child Against Scalp Ringworm Exposure

During recent years there have been a number of serious outbreaks of ringworm of the scalp in children. This is in some respects quite different from ordinary ringworm, and although it is comparatively easy to prevent, it is quite difficult to treat.

This kind of ringworm is likely to produce scaly patches on the back and sides of the head. On these patches the hair appears dull in color and is often broken off near the roots. In fact, the hair may fall out entirely in irregular areas.

Treatment is not too satisfactory, as most of the ointments containing chemicals which work on other kinds of fungus infections of the skin are not successful for this. X-ray treatment has been used with some success.

Take Precautions

The most important thing to do about ringworm of the scalp is to recognize its infectious nature and to stop it from spreading. The backs of seats in movie theatres seem to be responsible for a great many cases. In outbreaks of scalp ringworm it has been suggested that movie house furniture should be dis-

When ringworm of the scalp is really epidemic in a community an attempt should be made to find all of the cases by making a survey of the school children, and examining the pre-school children in families where an older brother or sister is found infected. Children in institutions are even more likely to be exposed than children in homes and, therefore, are especially in need of examination. Barbers can be of great help by being on the lookout for this condition.

## Gold Loses A Little Popularity

NEW YORK, Dec. 2 (AP)—Gold has lost some of its popularity in the last few days.

The little cloud it is under undoubtedly will be temporary. Gold has weathered some turbulent times in the last few score centuries. It is still a valuable thing to have.

But currently there seems to be a tendency here and there to give a cold shoulder to gold either in its present limited monetary role or in its possible future usefulness.

The most immediate reaction comes from Paris where there is a gold market actively reflecting what men think of gold. On a longer term basis, there is an indirect reaction out of Washington where all thoughts of gold seem to have vanished for the moment.

In Paris the price that gold demands in paper francs has been going down steadily for the past week. The old American \$20 gold piece in Paris started trading today at around 20,000 francs. Only a few days ago that same piece of gold commanded the equivalent of about \$200.

In other words, the Frenchman would rather have paper francs than lower and lower prices. One report from Paris indicated there was a general pressure among gold holders to get cash—possibly for Christmas shopping.

Of course, the Paris gold market is something of an Allen-in-Wonderland affair. To begin with there is no objection to a Frenchman or American owning a \$20 gold piece in Paris and buying and selling it. But if they tried it in this country, they would be liable to arrest. Using gold for money in America has been illegal since 1933.

Then, too, the \$20 gold piece is really a \$35 gold piece. It has been worth nearly that on the books ever since President Roosevelt raised the price of gold in steps from \$20.67 a fine ounce to \$35 back in 1933-34.

But the Frenchman regards it as equivalent to a \$60 gold piece. He is willing to change his money for gold at around 21,000 francs, and with the franc officially at 350 to the dollar, that figures out at \$60.

What the Frenchman thinks gold is worth in any currency is just about the system that has been used for centuries to determine what is known as the value of gold. Governments have been unable to set a price and make everybody conform to their opinion. The U. S. government, which says gold is worth \$35 an ounce, has been unable to hold that price line in the small free gold markets around the world.

Replicas of semi-fabricated gold or unrefined gold have been held down to that level. All monetary gold is \$35.

The U. S. price represents an anchor. Washington officials from the president on down have declared repeatedly we won't change the gold price.

Those declarations, however, did not have the effect on the Paris market that one cock-eyed report had this week. Some two years ago atomic scientists made a small amount of gold by bombarding a form of mercury with neutrons. It was a costly laboratory experiment carried out in an atomic pile. But after the report reached Paris this week, the price of gold was jolted down severely.

That shows the tender grasp holding gold.

### Little Book Will Be Big Help Come Time for Taxes

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (AP)—For 25 cents you can get a lot of information of making out your 1949 income tax.

You don't have to figure the tax on your 1949 income, or pay it, till 1950.

But if you want a lot of detailed information there's a government booklet you can buy. It's called "Your Federal Income Tax."

It runs to 128 pages, is put out by the internal revenue bureau which collects your tax, and is intended to answer a lot of questions.

You can buy it by sending 25

cents to the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C.

Last year the government put out a similar booklet and sold 265,000 copies.

In 1949 about \$3 million people filed an income tax return on their 1948 income. In 1950 around eight million are expected to file a return on their 1949 income.

When the income tax deadline—its March 15, 1950—draws near, this writer and other newsmen will write series of stories explaining who does what about his income tax.

Good Buy

But none of these stories can go into the details and cover as many different problems as are treated in this booklet. So it's a good quarter's investment for a great many people.

The government will mail—everyone who filed a return in 1949—an income tax form for filling their return in 1950.

It will send out two kinds of forms: an easy one, called 1040A, and one that requires a little more work, called 1040.

With the latter the government will enclose a 16-page booklet explaining some of the details of income tax filing.

Still, this booklet, helpful as it is, does not cover as much ground as the 128 page booklet explained above.

Example

As an example of some of the fields treated in the larger booklet:

It shows the step-by-step way of filling out a return; it covers things like contribution deductions, medical and dental expenses, traveling expense deductions, alimony and automobile deductions, payment and refund of taxes, and so on.

This booklet, as a result of suggestions and comments on the previous year's booklet, has been improved and enlarged.

In his preface, the commissioner of internal revenue, George J. Schoenher, says:

"The average taxpayer can hardly expect that the reading of this booklet will make him a qualified tax expert, but it is believed that a careful perusal will result in a better understanding of the tax laws, and will, in most cases, provide the information desired."
