

# Football Tough on Fans This Year; 20 Deaths Caused by Excitement

NEW YORK, Dec. 2 (AP)—This year's major college football season was harder on spectators than on players.

The score—20 spectators died of heart attacks. Player deaths 0. And possibly the most important sign of all—two of the spectators dropped dead while looking on television. All the others either died at games or shortly after.

**Think**  
This is something for you to think about—if, and it's a big if, you are one of those persons with certain known heart weaknesses. The facts about hearts and competition are taken from the New York Heart association.

Were the heart deaths at football mostly among older persons? The available reports do not fully answer this question, but indicate that there were mostly the victims. There is no possibility of finding

out the percentage of older spectators, and so statistics cannot tell you at what age to stop watching football.

**Tips**  
But medical science has some good tips. First, what a football game does to your body. It does the same thing as getting angry, putting on a tough setting position, arguing fiercely or fighting or watching a fight or any stiff competition.

The effect is on your circulation, the flow of your blood. Your peripheral arteries contract a bit. These are the smallest of the arteries, the last ones to distribute blood before it goes into the veins for its return to the heart.

The pinched arteries interfere with flow of blood through its last outgoing gate. So the blood pressure goes up. And so your heart pumps faster.

None of these things is bad, unless you happen to have a circulatory weakness, which may be a bad heart, but which can also include a number of other weaknesses associated with the heart and blood circulation.

**Strain**  
If you have one of those, then the extra strain can break the weak point.

Drinking and eating and yelling along with games is an added hazard for bad hearts. And a special one is a blonde.

What can you do about it? This answer you are going to like: Remember that you have a weak heart. Just think pretty often about relaxing and enjoying the spectacle, instead of quarterbacking it yourself.

**When it Rains, It Pours**  
ALHAMBRA, Calif., Dec. 2 (AP) Jack Waldron, 30, may have a slight bit of explaining to do in traffic court.

Traffic officers charged: Waldron drove on the sidewalk and through a vacant lot.

The car had no license plates; no registration; no windshield; no muffler; no headlights; no tail light; no horn; no emergency brake; illegal exhaust pipes and doors that were welded shut.

Waldron also lacked a driver's license. Then they booked him yesterday on suspicion of grand theft, auto.

# Irate Hoover Lashes Foes Of Economy

NEW YORK, Dec. 2 (AP)—Some "cheap politicians" like to talk about government economy, says former President Herbert Hoover, but they're afraid to practice it.

Hoover lashed out last night at four groups which he said are trying to thwart governmental reorganizations and economies recommended in the Hoover commission's report.

Chief of these, he said, are "groups of citizens between the ages of 21 and 65 who demand to be fed by the taxpayers instead of having the courage to produce a living for themselves."

Hoover spoke at a dinner of the Greater New York Citizens committee for the Hoover report. He had this to say about politicians:

"There are cheap politicians who passionately demand economy and at the same time make cowardly attacks upon public officials and members of congress who practice it on the orators' constituents."

The other two anti-reorganization groups, he said, are governmental departments that think reorganization is good "for everybody except themselves" and citizens who seek the same way whenever any change affects them.

Despite the opposition, Hoover predicted eventual acceptance of his proposals "because of the support we are receiving from the American people."

# Shaw Tough On Wartime Pacifists

GLASGOW, Scotland, Dec. 2 (AP) George Bernard Shaw says that if war comes, pacifists must "shoot or be shot."

Answering a staff member of the Forward, Glasgow labor weekly, who asked how to get established as a registered conscientious objector to military service, the tart-tongued socialist playwright wrote:

"A country that engages in war, rightly or wrongly, is like a ship that has struck a breaker and is leaking. The order must be 'all hands to the pumps,' no matter how faulty or wicked the navigators may have been....

"Pacifists should do all they can to prevent war, but if it nevertheless breaks out, it is too late to do anything but fight."

She won a divorce from the 35-year-old movie thespian yesterday, charging mental cruelty.

The Scotts were married February 21, 1935, at Dallas, Tex. They will share custody of their daughter Waverly, 13. Each parent will have the child six months of each year. Mrs. Scott was awarded the family home and \$500 a week for 32 weeks.

Found dead in the home were Mrs. Fannie Bean, 35, and Dorris Jean, 11. Donald Ray Bean, 9, was seriously injured.
