## GRAINS IN BRISK ADVANCE

CHICAGO, Dec. 3 (AP)—Grain markets threw off early hesitancy and moved up briskly in late dealings on the board of trade today. The advance was led by wheat, which jumped more than 2 cents at times. A little short covering and lifting of hedges against export sales of cash wheat contributed to the bread cereal price advance. Very little selling pressure was exerted against the market. Some traders felt prices would have to advance further to bring out much cash wheat from the country.

The rest of the market mainly followed the advance in wheat. Receipts of cash corn and oats continued small. Both soybeans and lard were influenced by stronger prices for vegetable oils. Dealings in the wheat commodity were quite active for a Saturday. Wheat closed 1/8-3/4 higher, December \$2.21 1/4-1/2, corn was 1/4-1/2 higher, December \$1.30 1/4-1/2, oats were unchanged to 1 cent higher, December 77 1/2-1/4, soybeans were 2 to 2 1/2 higher, December \$2.35 1/4-1/2, and lard was unchanged to 15 cents a hundred pounds higher, December \$10.37.

## Stocks Make New Progress

NEW YORK, Dec. 3 (AP)—The stock market made new progress today but with a little less sparkle than displayed on Thursday and Friday.

Gains of fractions to around a point were spread through the entire list. The improvement followed yesterday's rise to a 13-month high in the fastest trading of the year.

Rapid business lifted sales to the highest figure for any Saturday this year. Turnover was at the rate of about 900,000 shares for the two-hour session.

The present move, a continuation of a rise that started back in mid-June, was sparked Thursday by strike and ordered hisetoinair news that ohn J. Lewis, coal labor leader, had ended a short-lived strike and ordered his men back to work.

Railroad issues, which dominated market action during the past two days, moved along with the rest of the market today without putting on any fireworks.

The bond market was on a steady footing, with rails bought on a selective basis.

Hog receipts this week expanded to the largest total—87,000 salable head—for any week in more than five years. Barrows and gilts lost 50 cents to \$1.00 for the period. Wholesale pork also declined.

Final hog prices were only 50 to 75 cents above the \$14.75 government guide price for the month of December, the agriculture department reported.

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## Educators Seek More Funds

PORTLAND, Dec. 3 (AP)—Delegates to the Oregon Education association representative council meeting considered today the best way to get another \$11,000,000 for schools.

A sum is expected to be set aside by the association to promote the increase in state school funds. A pamphlet explaining the school fund situation is contemplated.

Among recommendations from the rural education committee was one that the county superintendent be appointed, not elected. The group also proposed that rural teachers salaries be as high as city teachers' and that non-high school districts be placed under high school districts.
