

Hoover Taking Economy Fight Back to Capital; Budget Policies Probed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—Herbert Hoover is coming back to Washington to push along a new drive to reorganize the government as a step toward economy.

The republican former president will speak next Monday night before the national reorganization conference. His theme will be one that some GOP party members are voicing as a rallying cry for the 1950 congressional campaign—a contention that excess spending and high taxes are threatening the existence of the republic.

Speaking at a non-partisan forum, Hoover is expected to stick to his main topic that widespread savings can be made by reorganization of the government.

"Principal Danger"
In a preview of his speech in New York last week, however, he covered a broader field. He said that the principal danger to the republic lies in the attitude of many groups in the country who think they ought to be fed by the taxpayers instead of making a living for themselves.

This is the sort of thing Senator Taft (R-Ohio) has been talking about in attacks on the "hand-out state" which he says is the Truman administration's aim. Guy O. Claiborn, the GOP national chairman, varied the phrase by calling it a "poorhouse state."

Practical
Hoover said economy in government is a practice, not a theory. He is likely to find a difference of opinion in Washington over how much economy is practical.

Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo), who agrees that wasteful spending ought to be eliminated, said it's a lot easier to talk about cutting the budget than to do it.

The Wyoming senator heads the senate-house economic committee. He told a reporter he thinks that any effort to cut outlays for such things as highway building and fighting a stream pollution would merely reduce the opportunities for business and "cast a wet blanket upon our economy."

Big Expenses
He noted that money for national defense, international payments, veterans benefits and interest on the public debt now accounts for about 75 per cent of the budget.

"The only substantial way of reducing expenditures beyond what the president has attempted is by further curtailing necessary outlays to contain communism, to prepare for national defense and to meet obligations arising from past wars," he said.

At the same time, O'Mahoney said that any increase in taxes, such as President Truman hinted at recently, not only would be a mistake but "a practical impossibility."

Tax Revision
Instead, he said the tax system ought to be revised to provide incentives for business expansion which would produce more tax revenue for the government.

O'Mahoney's committee will go over budget procedures with Budget Director Frank Pace in a closed session today.

It will begin hearings tomorrow on business investment practices in a roundtable conference with members of the commerce department's small business advisory committee.

U. S. Labor Department Sees No Critical West Unemployment Situation

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—The labor department foresees no critical unemployment in the West, generally, during the winter months.

It warns, however, that jobs will decrease in most sections after the first of the year.

For the Seattle, Wash., area, for instance, the bureau of employment security says unemployment is "not expected to reach very substantial proportions."

In contrast, increased unemployment is anticipated in the Tacoma and Spokane areas. Despite a 20-per cent drop in agricultural employment between July and September in the Spokane area, the September labor surplus there is described as "only slight." That at Tacoma, where a couple of plywood mills closed, is called "moderate."

Portland
At Portland, Ore., a "small" further decline in employment is looked for after the first of the year, with a layoff of workers in the seasonal food processing industry.

In California, as may be expected because of their differing industries, sharp contrasts are found in the larger labor markets.

San Diego's situation is expected to improve by the first of the year.

The labor market in Los Angeles is expected to be determined by the extent to which reductions are made in forces engaged in primary and fabricated metal production and in shipbuilding.

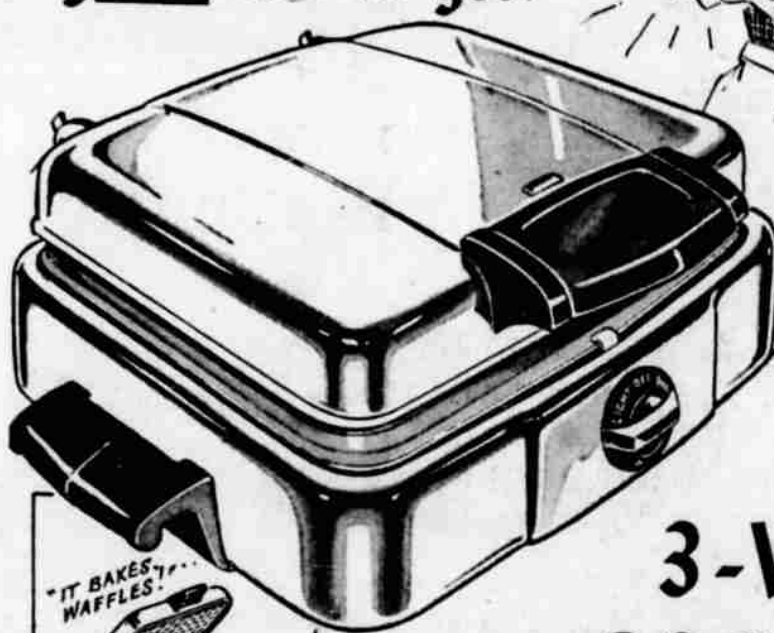
