Legion Leaders Give Rules For Sex Crimes Prevention

SEATTLE, Dec. 5 (AP)—A set of rules for parents to aid in the prevention of sex crimes against their children was recommended yesterday by American Legion child welfare leaders, as the initial step in a long range national program.

The rules were approved by delegates from 11 Western states, meeting here in the Legion's Western child welfare conference.

- They included:
1. Know your child's whereabouts and associates;
 2. Enforce your own curfew;
 3. Train your child to go straight home from school;
 4. Train your child not to accept rides or favors from strangers;
 5. Report suspicious actions to your police promptly and frankly.

National Meet
The Legion committee, studying the sex crime problem, urged a national conference to be called and a national commission created to study the issue. The special committee is headed by past National Commander Stephen F. Chadwick of Seattle.

The committee also urged all communities to back up parental protective measures with the following actions:

1. Light up your dark places;
 2. Support an adequate police department;
 3. Discourage any practice requiring young children to be abroad after dark without proper supervision;
 4. Invite police and juvenile authorities to instruct and advise parent groups;
 5. Enforce laws against the sale and circulation of obscene literature and pictures.
- A cooperative plan for child welfare under the sponsorship of the American Legion was endorsed in the morning session by Randal Snake of Indianapolis, associate national child welfare director for the Legion.

Robeson, Soviet Movie Subject

MOSCOW, Dec. 5 (AP)—The Soviet Union is going to make a motion picture about Paul Robeson.

An official announcement said the scenario is being written by Anatole Surov, author of the currently popular play, "The Mad Haberdasher," which satirizes President Truman.

The announcement said the film will be titled "Paul Robeson," but gave no other details.

The American Negro singer is a very popular figure in the Soviet Union. A mountain peak recently was named after him in Central Asia and mountain climbers placed his bust, in bronze, on top of it. His portrait hangs in the window of a photographic studio on Revolution square here in Moscow. His records are frequently played.

Usable Klamath Land Upped 55% in Past 6 Months by Conservation

Usable land acreage in the Klamath soil conservation district has increased 55 per cent in the last six months due to work done by the department, as announced by their office.

The increase is a result of new acreage inclusions and new districts added.

Training
Twenty-two members of the department have just completed a three day training school here, in which directors from the regional office set up methods and explained techniques by which plans can be cooperated in soil conservation work.

L. V. Benjamin, regional training division of Portland, conducted the school. Don Williams, Portland assistant conservationist, presented ideas and general trends of conservation work brought out in a recent Chicago meeting of national conservation workers.

"Soil conservation has increased the value of land in this area over \$4 an acre," according to directors. "Four years ago, the conservation service had only 14 districts under conservation here, now there are 34 districts."

Tulelake Man To Jail From Hospital

YREKA—Gene Molar, 26-year-old Tulelake laborer shot by a Tulelake policeman last month, was moved from the county hospital to the county jail here this week to face prosecution on four charges.

Molar, wounded in the abdomen while resisting arrest by Tulelake police officers who had been sent to quell a disturbance, has been charged with resisting arrest, two counts of assault and battery, and disorderly conduct.

He had been brought to the hospital after the shooting.

Delegates from Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Utah and Wyoming named a three-member program committee to draft organizational procedure prior to the Northwest tourist conference scheduled to be held in Pullman next spring.

Committee members include Chester H. Armstrong, assistant director of Oregon's state parks; Mrs. Ruth E. Peeler, vice chairman of the Washington state parks and recreation commission, and Walter Rankin, Montana state parks director.
