Joe "Inspirational"; Tom Best Lineman

Halfback Joe Nichols, Tackle Tom Abner and Guard Don Taylor were singled out for awards last night in the Willard hotel at the Lions club annual Pelican football banquet.

The awards were given by secret ballot of the football squad. Nichols, described by Coach Bob Henderson as the "hardest running back on the team," was given the nod as the "most inspirational" player.

Abner was named the outstanding lineman of the 1949 Pelican grid machine. Taylor received the award for compiling the most comprehensive football notebook of the year.

Pollution Of Rivers Being Probed

PORTLAND, Dec. 7 (AP)—Williamette valley pulp and paper mill executives have been asked by the Oregon sanitary authority to appear here February 15 and discuss river pollution correctives.

Authority Chairman Harold Wendel said yesterday the meeting was planned to bring to a head the state's plans to halt dumping of pulp and paper mill wastes into the river by December 31, 1951.

State engineers are to submit evidence supporting the order the authority intends to issue against the industrial plants, Wendel said.

Letters to Cottage Grove, Philomath and Toledo demanding the appearance of city officials at the next authority meeting were authorized. Members said the towns must at that time submit financial and building plans for sewage disposal systems.

Profess A pollution protest was received from a Clackamas county area signed by 57 property owners. It said the M & S Canning company and the Oregon Mushroom company were dumping wastes into Kellogg creek.

Wendel explained that the rural area situation would be taken up after major pollution sources, industries and municipalities, were controlled.

Coos Bay City Engineer R. H. Erichsen was told the city's plans for a \$100,000 sewer system would not be approved until a treatment plant was included. The sewage would be dumped into the bay under the existing plan. Erichsen reported the money was not available for a treatment unit.

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"You Can't Knock 'Em All Out", Growls Graziano

CLEVELAND, Dec. 7 (AP)—Rocky Graziano, once the kayo king of the middleweights, today shrugged off a rusty performance against George (Sonny) Horne and growled: "You can't knock 'em all out. Some nights you can't knock anybody out."

Rocky meant his disgust, too. He won his third straight 10-round decision over Horne last night at the Cleveland News' 24th annual Christmas fund show. But he got socked pretty hard in the last five rounds.

Graziano's trainer, Whitey Bimstein, wasn't so pessimistic. "You did all right, considering it was only your second fight in just about a year," consoled Bimstein. "You needed that one under your belt."

Rocky's last fight was a kayo over another hot title contender, Charley Fusari, in the 10th round. In the third round, Horne's face took on a silly expression. When Graziano slammed his jaw with a hard right, He started sinking.

Again in the fifth, the same thing happened. But in both cases the bell clanged in time.

The life started to ooze out of Rocky after that, and Horne began to look around with more interest.

He raised a cut over Rocky's left eye in the sixth and worked studiously on that for the remainder of the bout.

Referee Jackie Davis gave the 159½-pound Graziano 8 rounds to 2; Judge John Bayanek scored 7 to 3 for Rocky; Judge Charlie Bill gave the 160-pound Horne five rounds and Graziano five.

"Graziano came so close to dropping him twice, though," said Bill. "That I thought he was surely entitled to the verdict."

In another fight, Sandy Saddler of New York, ex-featherweight champion, won himself a new title: the junior lightweight championship. He did this in a slow motion affair with Cuba's Orlando Zulueta, winning a 2 to 1 decision.

Cleveland's Chuck Hunter outpointed the favored Dick Wagner of Portland, Oregon, in a lightweight 10-rounder.

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Irish Sign For Middies

CLEVELAND, Dec. 7 (AP)—Notre Dame's football team will play Navy here November 4 next year, Ben T. Franklin of the chamber of commerce special events committee said today.

It will be the first big game in Cleveland since November 2, 1947, when the Irish beat Navy, 27 to 0. The two teams have played each other here seven times.

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Grizzlies Win

Hart Receives Heisman Trophy

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 (AP)—Leon Hart, Notre Dame's All-America end, will receive the Heisman memorial trophy tonight as "the outstanding college football player" of the 1949 season.

The six-foot-four, 265-pound Turtle Creek, Pa., athlete was voted the honor by some 900 sports writers and broadcasters throughout the country.

He is the second lineman to capture the prize in the 15 years the trophy has been awarded. The other was Larry Kelley, Yale's famous end, who was honored in 1936.

Cupid Loses Bout With Soup

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 7 (AP)—Soup, or rather, not enough of it, is the latest grounds for divorce.

Mrs. Violet Stern, 27, obtained a decree yesterday after she told the court her husband, Max Stern, 33, Culver City restaurateur, loved soup more than he did her.

"It might sound silly," she testified, "but my husband's chief complaint against me was that I didn't make soup often enough."

A settlement requires Stern to pay \$140 monthly support for their two children and awarded Mrs. Stern \$12,000 in assets. They were married in Chicago in 1939 and separated 18 months ago.
