

Weaving, Ceramics, Classes Planned

The Klamath Art Association held its regular monthly meeting Wednesday, November 30 in the Art Center gallery.

A short business meeting was conducted by Clayton Burrell.

Robert Banister announced that classes in weaving and ceramics, under the supervision of the University of Oregon Extension Division, would start on January first. University credits will be given for these courses and an accredited teacher will be sent from Eugene to teach the classes which will be held at the Art Center. The tuition fee will be \$10.00 for each session.

The speaker of the evening was Albert Downs, art instructor in the Klamath schools. His talk was on "The Home Approach to Ceramics" and he explained fully how pottery making can be a hobby that anyone can do in their own home. He showed examples of several methods of pottery making, and told of the many experiments he has made in the development of local materials. He showed examples of pottery he had made using a glass made from the black sand on Sun Mountain and one using pumice ash. He is now experimenting with other local natural materials.

After his talk Downs demonstrated the thrown method of making pottery on a potter's wheel. He later gave a demonstration of the casting method and slab method of pottery making.

The paintings of Robert Banister and Ralph Pelke were exhibited on the studio walls and were enjoyed by all members present. Banister's paintings represented many local scenes and work he had done on several vacation trips in various parts of the country. Pelke's paintings were scenes from the Monterey and Carmel, California country where he is now painting.

Mrs. U. S. Balentine and Mrs. Robert Banister served refreshments at the social hour held after the meeting.

Robert Banister, KUHS art instructor, delighted members of Quota club at their Monday night dinner meeting at the Pelican, with his talk on the progress and ability of Klamath Falls art students, and with his display of many outstanding examples of their work.
