

# Reames Club Expansion Plan Voted

An increased membership roster, a stepped-up social calendar for the year and possible acquisition of some 35 acres of land adjacent to the Reames Golf and Country club were voted by members at last night's annual meeting, held at the club house.

Loren Palmerton, Klamath lumberman, was elected president of the club. Members named Earl Weimar, Carl Woods, Jim Kerns Jr., Palmerton and Dr. C. J. Cox as directors for the coming year. Howard Perrin, outgoing president, automatically becomes a trustee of the organization.

### More Members

Thirty-five additional playing memberships were voted, bringing the total to 235. It was felt that the added number could now be carried at the course without danger of overcrowding playing space.

The possibility of constructing an additional nine holes was discussed with most members strongly in favor of the plan on an if-and-when basis. The incoming directors were directed to study the proposal of acquiring an additional 35 acres of land lying at the present borders of the club. This land lies to the east and to the north of the club and will afford adequate room for the improvements if they should be undertaken.

Striving for more use of clubhouse facilities the present board has moved to make meals and entertainment available to members and guests. Mr. and Mrs. Stan Ruggles have taken over the restaurant end and expect to be ready for business within a few days on a full time basis. Ray Honsberger, the new golf pro, told members of his plans for the coming playing year and predicted a much larger turnout for the course than in the past.

# Nature Society Meet Thursday, 8 P. M.

The Nature society of the Klamath region will meet Thursday at 8 p. m. in the chamber of commerce, 323 Main.

The Nature society will organize its program for the Christmas bird count at this time. One day of each Christmas week is devoted to making a census of local birds. Hundreds of communities all over the United States join in this undertaking and thousands of observers take to the open to record the species present and tally the number of birds seen. The 1948 Christmas count in the Klamath area was made by 11 observers who worked in five

groups, they noted 60 species of birds and counted 4826 individuals. The society hopes to be able to have a larger number of observers in the field this year.

The Nature society is a non-technical organization formed to assist the people of the Klamath basin who are interested in outdoor subjects and its meetings are open to the public.

Wheat showed an easier trend most of the day, reflecting an increase in marketings of cash grain in some sections of the country.

Wheat closed 1/4 cent lower, December \$2.19, corn was 1/4 cent lower to 1/2 cent higher, December \$1.28-1.29, oats were 1/4 cent lower to 1/2 cent higher, December 75-76, rye was 1/2 cent higher, December \$1.43-1.44, soybeans were 1 to 1 1/2 cent higher, December \$2.33-2.34, and lard was 5 to 10 cents a hundred pounds lower, December \$10.15.
