L. Nielsen, agricultural statistician at Portland where the data are being summarized.

PMA to Hold Elections This Week

about tree numbers and future production, according to M. D. Thomas, OSC extension economist and joint leader of the project.

Need Data
A complete inventory of walnut and filbert trees by ages and varieties was approved as a joint federal-state research project at the urgent request of the northwest nut industry. Such information is not now available.

Many report forms mailed November 17 have not been returned. Thomas reports. These are needed to determine state and county totals and to complete the inventory of current plantings. Growers still have time to count their trees and report. A second reminder form will soon be sent to those who have not reported.

Individual reports are to be used only in arriving at totals, Thomas emphasizes. They are important for this purpose but have no further value after they are included in the summary.

The county and state totals are useful for many purposes. They will help to indicate the size and kind of outlets needed to market the crops satisfactorily, and may be used in tariff negotiations, in freight rate hearings, and in developing advertising, financing and government aid programs.

Most Oregon Farms Are Now Modern

NEW YORK—The average Oregon farm home may not be a streamlined pushbutton machine the housewife can run from her armchair, but it's not far behind the city dwelling in manageability and work savers. A recent government survey shows that 99 per cent of Oregon farms are electrified.

About 62,700 of this state's farms are now served by electricity. With work aids supplied by electricity and such improvements as dishwashing machines, easy-to-clean clay tile kitchens, and automatic heating, the modern Oregon housekeeper finds little to envy in her city cousin's surroundings.

But department of agriculture figures show there are still more than 400 Oregon farm dwellings without central-station electric service. Many more lack such modern city conveniences as gas ranges, clay tile bathrooms, and radiant heating.

Still, the little gray home in the West ain't want she used to be—fortunately for the harried house-

wife. And building experts say it won't be long before the average farm house has everything a city home can boast except traffic noise, smog, grime and crowds.
