Fort Klamath
Featuring the regular meeting of the Civic Improvement club held Friday afternoon in the clubhouse was a talk by Ranger Wayne Howe of Crater Lake national park, who explained plans for a Red Cross standard first-aid class to be held in Fort Klamath under sponsorship of the Klamath county chapter of the American Red Cross, of which Miss Kathryn Geis of Klamath Falls is executive secretary. It was decided that the clubhouse would be used for the meetings, which will be on Monday and Thursday of each week, starting with the tentative date of December 29, from 7:30 to 9:30 p. m., until the 18-hour course in first-aid is completed.
Acting as instructors will be four men of the Crater Lake park service, including Rangers Wayne Howe and Duane Fitzgerald, Paul Turner, who is warehouseman, and Paul Koehler, electrician. Two of the men will come to Fort Klamath to instruct at each meeting, and Howe stated they hope to have a class of at least twenty-five for the first-aid lessons. Inasmuch as local people are so far from available medical care, the first-aid course is especially valuable, teaching as it does what to do before medical service can be obtained. Everyone interested is cordially invited to enroll for the classes, which will start tentatively on December 29. "If the event the date is changed in the meantime notice will be given in plenty of time," Howe stated.
The business meeting was opened by Mrs. W. B. Hescock, president, who then turned over the order of business to the newly-elected president, Mrs. Joanna Taylor. There will be no regular meeting on December 18, it was decided, due to

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
