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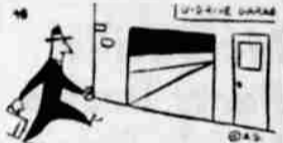

QUESTION: I am a salesman and I use my car in business. How do I obtain insurance which would enable me to pay for renting another car if mine was stolen? I'm referring to the period from loss of the car till it was either recovered or the company settled for the loss.

ANSWER: The standard auto theft policy provides for reimbursement not to exceed five dollars per day for rental of a suitable car. Total payment for this purpose not to exceed one hundred fifty dollars or the cash value of the stolen car.

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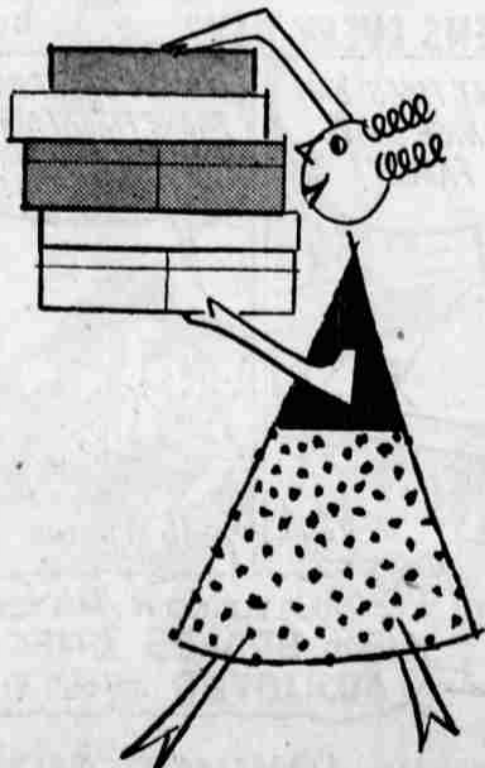
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
