TULELAKE—The Mariners club which carries an annual cargo of community improvement is sponsoring a technicolor film of a big game hunt recently completed in Africa by two well known California men.

The thrill packed motion picture will be shown at the Marcha theatre, Tuesday, December 20, by John Lachenmaier of Shafter, well known business man who made the trip with Dr. William Moore of Bakersfield.

New Sidewalk

All proceeds from the showings will go to the Mariners club to be applied on construction of a sidewalk in front of the Tulelake Community church.

The theatre is being donated by Vac Kalina, manager. The show will last for two hours. The film shows wild animals in action, many of them charging. The two hunters bagged 130 head of wild game, including one elephant each, one rhino each, one lion each and three buffalo apiece.

Lachenmaier will act as narrator during the picture. The two men left Bakersfield August 16 and flew from New York to London, then to Alexandria, Egypt and on to Kampalla, in the Province of Uganda, and finally to Nairobi, East Africa.

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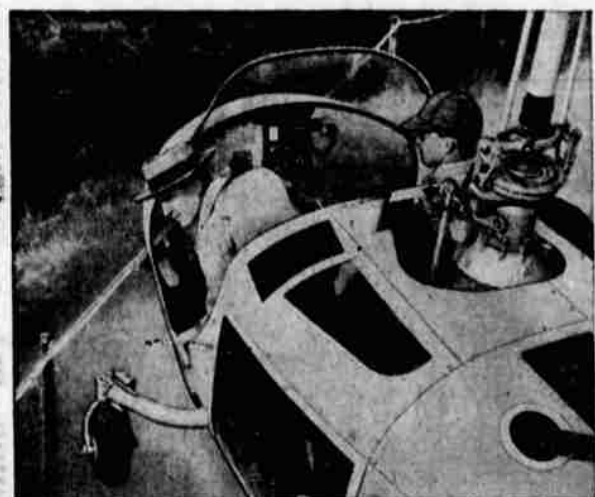
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
