NEW YORK, Dec. 15 (AP)—Manager Billy Southworth of the Braves has insisted all along there wouldn't be any house cleaning or head-lopping as a result of all that feuding and fusing last season. ... Pro Merger Forces Players To Consider

NEW YORK, Dec. 15 (AP)—Only one member of the 1949 college All-America—Jim Martin, the big Notre Dame tackle—is dead set on carrying on in professional football.

Four of the honored squad insist they definitely won't play for money while the other six are doubtful, their enthusiasm chilled by the recent merger of the two major pro circuits.

"It looks like the quick and easy money is gone," wailed Clayton Tonnemaker, the 245-pound center from Minnesota. "I'll probably try to capitalize on my physical education degree."

But in case the pros would like to dish out some of that heavy sugar, the Minneapolis boy added: "I'm listening."

Sharing the "undecided" fence with Tonnemaker are Leon Hart, the Notre Dame end who was voted the season's outstanding individual performer; his teammate, Fullback Emil Suhr; Halfback Deak Walker of Southern Methodist; and those two great guards, Rod Franz and John Schweder.

Triple threat Charlie Justice, the two-time All-American halfback from North Carolina gave the pros a cold shoulder.

Stringing along with him are Arnold Galiffa, the talented T-quarterback of Army; Wade Walker, Oklahoma tackle, and Jim Williams, the Rice end.

Hart, drafted originally by the Detroit Lions and Baltimore Colts, declared he would play pro ball if he got the right offer, say, "something like \$25,000 a starter."

No such plump enticements are expected from the new 13-team set-up. There's a surplus of experienced talent and competitive bidding is out.

Junior varsity games, starting at 7 o'clock, will precede both Friday and Saturday night matches.

Friday the Pelican Jayvees will play Weyerhaeuser of the city independent league and Saturday they will take on Hal's Sports of the city league.

Vandenburg Seeks Status

SEATTLE, Dec. 1 (AP)—Bill Vandenburg, who signed a professional basketball contract with the Boston Celtics but never played or drew a salary, said today he was seeking reinstatement as an amateur.

The 1949 University of Washington captain signed last spring on a make-good-first basis. Before he had a chance to show his ability, Vandenburg fell ill and was released by the Celtics.

The defensive star of the Washington team joined the Seattle Alphas last spring to play in the national AAU tourney at Oklahoma City and there came to the attention of the Celtics.

The second bout features Sam Walker, Merrill, and Richard Dickens, Chillicothe.
