An easy-to-mix hormone solution used as a dip will prevent leaves from falling off holly boughs shipped for Christmas decorations, according to R. Ralph Clark at OSC. Shipping undipped holly is frequently a source of disappointment, because, more often than not, it will arrive at its destination with leaves separated from the stems.

Supervisor Named For Rogue Forest

The promotion of Laurence G. Jolley, assistant supervisor of the Mount Hood national forest to the position of supervisor of the Rogue river national forest has been announced by regional forester H. J. Andrews in charge of the Pacific northwest region, Portland.

Jolley will replace supervisor Karl L. Janouch who will retire from the Forest service on December 31, Andrews said. His headquarters will be Medford.

Jolley is a native of Washington and was graduated from the University of Washington forest school in 1933. In 1935 he was assigned to the division of information and education in the regional office of the forest service in Portland, and in 1939 was appointed assistant conservationist. In 1940 Jolley was transferred to the Colville national forest in Washington as assistant ranger, was promoted to district ranger in charge of the Quileine district on the Olympic forest in 1942, and in 1944 he became staff assistant on the Chelan forest. He was advanced to the position of assistant supervisor on the Mount Hood forest in 1946.

Other personnel changes announced by regional forester Andrews are the assignment of Richard P. Bottcher to the staff of the Mount Hood national forest and of Carrol E. Brown to the Gifford Pinchot to succeed Lawrence O. Barrett who is being promoted to supervisor of the latter forest, and the transfer of Melvin H. Burke from the Wallawa forest staff to the regional office in Portland.

Each of these men has had a wide range of experience on a large number of national forests. Andrews said. Bottcher and Brown are natives of Washington, but both graduated from Oregon State college.

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Japanese Silk Exports Gain

TOKYO, (P)—The Japanese government Foreign Trade Corporation for textiles sees signs that the badly-slumped silk business may be re-

viving. Export contracts for more than 8500 bales of raw silk were signed in October, a gain of more than 1000 bales.

Silk men hope exports will reach 10,000 bales a month by the end of the year—but that will still be only one-fifth the pre-war level.

Cook both white and sweet potatoes in their skins to retain the greatest amount of vitamins and minerals. Use a small amount of water. Watch sweet potatoes to see that they do not overcook — they get tender quickly.

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GALA HOLIDAY CAKE

Mix together into a large bowl:

1 1/2 cups sifted cake flour 1/2 tsp. salt
2 tps. double-action baking powder 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
3 tps. single-action 1/2 tsp. cloves
1/2 cup Snowdrift (Emulsorized, quick-blending) 1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup milk

Mix enough to dampen flour. Beat 2 minutes. If by hand, count beating time only. With electric mixer, use "low speed"; scrape bowl often; scrape beaters after 2 minutes.

Add: 2 eggs, unbeaten
1 cup mince-meat (1 9-oz. package cooked with 1/2 cup water about 5 minutes)

Beat 1 minute. Turn into greased 8" square pan, lined with plain paper. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) about 40 minutes. Cool and frost with—



CREAM ICING: Cream 2 tps. Snowdrift and 3 tps. butter. Add 1/2 tsp. salt and 3 cups sifted confectioners' sugar alternately with 1/2 cup milk (or cream). Beat until smooth; add 1 tsp. vanilla. Spread on cake. Decorate with alternating diagonal stripes made with 1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries and picture.)

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
