Christmas in the Churches

Bible Story

JEPHTHAH



EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the 11th of a series from the Old Testament. The text is condensed from selections by Houston Harte for the new book, "In Our Image." Illustration by Guy Rowe also from the book.

The children of Ammon passed over Jordan to fight against Judah, and Israel was sore distressed. And the children of Israel cried unto the Lord. And the Lord said, ye have forsaken me, and served other gods: I will deliver you no more. Go and cry unto the gods ye have chosen; let them deliver you in the time of your tribulation. And the children of Israel said unto the Lord, We have sinned: do unto us whatsoever seemeth good unto thee; deliver us only this day. And they put away the strange gods and served the Lord; and his soul was grieved for the misery of Israel. Then the children of Ammon were gathered together, and encamped in Gilead. And the children of Israel assembled themselves, and encamped in Mispeh. Now Jephthah was a mighty man of valor. And the elders of Gilead said unto Jephthah, Come, and be our captain, that we may fight with the children of Ammon. Jephthah went, and the people made him head and captain over them.

And Jephthah sent messengers to the king of Ammon, saying, What hast thou to do with me, that thou art come against me to fight in my land? And the king of Ammon answered, Because Israel took away my land, when they came up out of Egypt; now therefore restore those lands again peaceably. And Jephthah sent messengers again to the king, and said, Israel took not away the land of Ammon, but the Lord God of Israel dispossessed the Amorites from before his people Israel. Wherefore I have not sinned against thee, but thou doest me wrong to war against me: the Lord the Judge be judge this day between the children of Israel and the children of Ammon. Howbeit the king of Ammon hearkened not to the words of Jephthah.

Then the Spirit of the Lord came upon Jephthah, and he vowed unto the Lord, if thou deliver the children of Ammon into mine hands, whatsoever cometh forth of my house to meet me, when I return in peace, I will offer up for a burnt offering. So Jephthah passed over unto the children of Ammon to fight them; and the Lord delivered them into his hands. And Jephthah came to Mizpeh unto his house, and his daughter came out to meet him with timbrels and with dances: and she was his only child. And he rent his clothes, and said, Alas, my daughter! thou art one of them that trouble me: for I have opened my mouth unto the Lord, and I cannot go back. And she said, My father, if thou hast opened thy mouth unto the Lord, do to me according to that which hath proceeded out of thy mouth. And she said, Let this be done for me: let me alone two months, that I may go up and down upon the mountains, and bewail my virginity. And he sent her away. And at the end of two months, she returned unto her father, who did with her according to his vow; and she knew no man. And it was a custom in Israel, that the daughters of Israel went yearly to lament the daughter of Jephthah the Gileadite four days in a year.
